

- *Right to freedom from coercion in matters related to sexuality*
Affirmation that the human rights of women include the right to have control over their own sexuality, free of coercion, discrimination and violence.
- *Indigenous women*
Statement on need to involve indigenous women in development, to recognize their right to education, to ensure equal access to health care, and to acknowledge traditional health care.
- *Diversity*
Agreement that recognition of and respect for the diversity of women be ensured. Additional barriers to equality, such as race, religion, ethnicity, disability, or being indigenous, taken into account. (Canadian initiative)
- *Women's access to economic resources*
Adoption of paragraph on the right of women to full and equal access to economic resources, including the right to inheritance and the ownership of land.
- *Unpaid work*
Statement that calls for measuring and valuing unremunerated work. (Canadian initiative)
- *Workers' rights*
Agreement on wording of women's right to freedom of association and on the "right to organize." (Canadian initiative)
- *Religion*
Reaffirmation of principles of freedom of thought, conscience and religion. Note that religion and belief can contribute to people's moral and spiritual needs, but any form of extremism may have a negative impact on women and can lead to violence and discrimination.
- *Punitive measures regarding abortion*
Statement that governments should review laws containing punitive measures (e.g., imprisonment) against women who have undergone illegal abortions and address the health impacts of unsafe abortion.
- *The family*
Statement that raising children requires shared responsibility of parents — women and men — and society as a whole; and that maternity and motherhood should not restrict the full participation of women in society. Agreement that the family, as the basic unit of society, should be strengthened; and that in different cultural, political and social systems, various forms of the family exist.
