Lang (Minister without Portfolio): (a) The Alberta Wheat Pool, the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, the Manitoba Pool Elevators, the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, the Canada Grains Council and the National Farmers Union. (b) None. (c) The ministers of agriculture of the provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. (d) Mr. G. L. Harrold for Alberta Wheat Pool, Mr. E. K. Turner for Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, Mr. G. Turner for Manitoba Pool Elevators, Mr. C. Monroe, Mr. D. Kirk and Mr. P. Babey for Canadian Federation of Agriculture, Mr. A. M. Runciman, and Dr. D. Dever for the Canada Grains Council, and Mr. R. Atkinson, Mrs. E. Potter, Mr. J. McCloy, Mr. D. Yonge, Mr. F. Dietz, Mr. F. Gudmundson, Mr. D. Robertson and Mr. S. Thiessen for the National Farmers Union. MOTOR VEHICLE SAFETY STANDARD

Question No. 1,608-Mr. Mather:

- 1. Is the Department of Transport considering requiring as a motor vehicle safety standard more effective car bumpers to reduce collision damage?
- 2. Is the Department considering requiring passive restraint "air bag" systems in new cars?

Mr. Gérard Loiselle (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Transport): 1. The Motor Vehicle Safety Act, which has recently received Royal assent, gives the government authority to create safety standards for the 22375—2

design, construction and functioning of motor vehicles for the protection of persons against injury or death. Pursuant to these powers, the government is considering a standard for increasing the effectiveness of car bumpers. Such factors as bumper height and energy absorption are under consideration. While such a standard would have as its primary purpose the reduction of injury, it would undoubtedly have the further important effect of reducing the cost of automobile repairs following minor collisions.

2. The current development and testing of such a device is being closely followed by the Ministry of Transport, and after suitable evaluation of all available evidence a decision will then be taken as to the acceptability of such restraint in motor vehicles in Canada.
