AMENDMENT TO PROVIDE FOR FULL REPORTING OF CHANGES

He said: Mr. Speaker, this bill is simply an amendment to have commissioners attach full reasons for the changes they are making in any reports that are being made at the time of the decennial revisions. It provides not only the reasons for the changes they advocate but they must comment on every representation that is made. Failure to do so calls for the invalidation of the report.
