REPORT ON AIR TRAVEL BY OFFICIALS-MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

In view of the fact that senior CBC executives are flying off next month to Cape Canaveral to watch the Anik launching on the sunny beaches of Florida, despite the fact that they will not be able to get within one half mile of the launch and may in fact have to watch it on television; in view of the fact that these flights are not defensible when the budgets for research and station operations for the CBC are being cut to the bone across Canada; and since there are communities in Canada such as Atlin which could receive CBC radio for a cost comparable to that of these flights—and surely the right to radio signals is more important than a porkbarrel trip to Florida—I move, seconded by the hon. member for Selkirk-Interlake (Mr. Sargeant):

PROPOSAL THAT HOUSE OBSERVE MINUTE OF SILENCE FOR WAR VICTIMS IN BEIRUT—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Henri Tousignant (Témiscamingue): Mr. Speaker, I wish to make a proposal similar to the one made by the member for Edmonton East (Mr. Yurko), who tried, unsuccessfully, to obtain the unanimous consent of the House. I think it is shocking that some hon. members should waste their time and energy on defending the comforts and conveniences of this House and fighting against wage restraint, while thousands of innocent people, children who could be our own, and teenagers and women are being struck down as a result of military attacks among civilized people, as is presently the case in Beirut. All conventional warfare is cruel, whether it takes place at the front or on the battlefield. But this is happening in the middle of a city, and children are being traumatized and perhaps crippled for the rest of their lives. I think this is absolutely barbaric. I therefore wish to propose to my colleagues, and I hope to obtain the unanimous consent of the House, that at the end of the oral question period, the House observe one minute of silence to express its respect for, and
