We are really talking about whether the majority will proceed to do the business of government or whether we will have a tyranny of the minority. In order to spare my hon. colleagues from any future embarrassment, because they do not like what we are reading into the record, we intend to eliminate the delay in the proceedings.

Mr. Riis: Another closure.

Mr. Lewis: We'll get to closure later. I want to point out just once more that we were sent here to govern, to respect the rights of the minorities, to keep this place open and do the work of the people of Canada. The NDP does not want to do the work of Canada so, therefore—

Mr. Riis: Point of order.

Mr. Lewis: I move:

## CANADIAN ALLIANCE FOR PEACE

LIBERAL PARTY'S PROGRAM—SIMILARITIES

Hon. André Ouellet (Papineau): Mr. Speaker, this morning, the Leader of the Liberal Party of Canada met the Canadian Peace Alliance, a coalition of over 400 organizations dedicated to peace across this country, which held its annual meeting on the weekend in Ottawa, under the theme: Vote for peace!

Of course, the Leader of the Opposition had a very constructive conversation with representatives of these peace organizations, in the course of which he recalled certain aspects of the Party's policy program, including the Party's rejection of the Mulroney Government's project to provide Canada's Armed Forces with a fleet of nuclear-powered submarines.

Second, the rejection of cruise missile testing in Canada, in view of the agreement signed by the United States and the Soviet Union, which will prohibit intermediate nuclear forces in Europe.

Third, the creation of a new international status for the Arctic by means of a multilateral treaty designed to stop the
