Why has the government disbanded citizen advisory boards, groups and councils that advocate changes? Is this a way to stifle criticism?

This budget proves that the government has no real commitment to human rights. When times are tough for Tories, human rights are the first to go.

UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Rex Crawford (Kent): Mr. Speaker, the unemployed workers in southwestern Ontario, the economic engine of Canada, are given no hope whatsoever by the recent budget. Plant closings of Motor Wheel Corporation, National Hardware, Standard Tube and Elan, to name only a few in Kent, have hit hard during the recession.

TAXATION

Mr. Gaby Larrivée (Joliette): Mr. Speaker, in recent weeks I received a number of letters from my constituents about the Canadian government's family policy. My constituents wrote to stress tax inequities between married couples and common law couples, and their concerns were entirely legitimate.

I would now like to inform the people of Joliette that the federal government has acted in response to their wishes in its latest budget. The federal budget will apply the same tax treatment to married couples and common law couples and will also restructure and improve family benefits by creating a single benefit for children. The new plan will increase child benefits by \$400 million annually.

Mr. Speaker, the latest budget clearly shows how sensitive the government is to the needs of Canadian families
