In the first place, there is the platform of the Liberal party, which was solemnly adopted at a convention held here in the month of June, 1893, presided over by the honourable gentleman who now leads this House, and there the tariff plank was laid down in fairly clear and unnistakable language. The general principles upon which tariff reform was to proceed were laid down; in short, it is practically to substitute a revenue tariff for a protective tariff; and now, honourable gentlemen, speaking of that, I am not going to quote the platform, but the description of a revenue tariff by the ex-Minister of Finance, which is on the whole, satisfactory. In the speech which 1 have already quoted, he says :

> Another system is to have a revenue tariff which selects a list of articles and places rates of impost upon those articles, chiefly with a view to the quickest, easiest and best method of raising the amount which is necessary, but also with the necessary sequence of incidental protection whenever this selected list includes those things which
