organization of the Greater Montreal area, are not

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clearly enough defined? PROF. LOCKHART: I think that would be fairly in the

PROF. LOCKHART: I don't believe, Mr. Principal, that

the definition as to powers between the Department of Education and the Protestant Committee is nearly clear is represent to democratic policy enough. That, to my mind, is going to be a pobitical

difficulty. ART: I don't quite see that argument.

THE PRINCIPAL: But, for getting the political phase of the question raised by the report - do you think that to invest the Protestant Committee and the organization Committee in the Greater Montreal area, is an appropriate thing to do and a wise thing to do?

PROF. LOCKHART: It is hard to speak to that and keep

away from the political entanglement that I know is there, but, generally speaking, I would say that if it could be done, I would be willing, given a proper Protestant Committee, to make it almost absolute, although I know that is impossible.

THE PRINCIPAL: But the proposal in that respect has real and intrinsic value?

PROF LOCKHART: Yes, I think we can take that on trust.

THE PRINCIPAL: Do you think that the power to allocat e funds appropriated by Parliament is in the domaine of
