

HARD TO SECURE MONEY FOR ROADS

Four Counties in Ontario Tied Up Thru Lack of Cash.

GENERAL WORK IS GOOD

Several Thousand Men Already at Work in Northern Ontario.

That there is to some extent an appreciable stringency in the financial affairs of the province is evidenced in the difficulty which several counties are experiencing in forwarding their good road schemes.

The general work, however, is proceeding well throughout Ontario and large gangs of men are now out upon the roads engaged in both provincial work and that organized under the bylaw and colonization arrangements.

In this latter field Supt. G. W. Bennett states that the splendid weather conditions now prevailing are helping wonderfully in getting a good start in the north. The snow is rapidly leaving the woods and within a few weeks the eleven hundred overseers will have taken charge of the several thousand men employed.

Mr. Bennett has just returned from an inspection visit in the Timiskaming district, and leaves again tonight to study the progress of the work on the south-Sudbury trunk line. Twelve miles of this he expects will be finished this summer. Before he leaves one hundred overseers will be despatched to the scene of their summer labors.

"THINGS ARE GETTING HELLSH IN TORONTO"

Says Alderman Wanless, Who Wants a Police Station at Hanlan's Point.

Department heads recommended to the property committee that the Yonge street firehall be leased for firehall purposes, and a site for a new firehall on a side street nearby be set forth.

Ald. Risk contended that the island is being given a costly police station that it does not need, and should be given instead a firehall in which firemen would be housed, better fire protection being very necessary.

"You're belittling the island when you place a police station there," said Ald. McRobie. "A \$200 cottage for policemen is all that is required, not an \$8000 station."

"When the baseball season is on there are sometimes several of the police crossing to the city with prisoners, and the number of police left cannot always cope with the crowd," said the chairman, Ald. Weston.

"The rowdy element in Toronto is growing so fast that it is now a serious menace," said Ald. Wanless. "Things are getting hellsish in this city, with the thrush of immigrants, special workers know this. There most certainly should be a police station at Hanlan's Point."

WANTS A SHARE TO SAVE HOUSE

Island Resident Won't Pay Ground Rent for a Water Lot.

"I want to hire a dock to moor my house to," said S. T. Sutton, who was with a deputation from Centre Island that waited upon the parks and exhibitions committee to request that the sand pump be sent to raise the land at a portion of the water front.

Others on the deputation complained of flooded property and insisted upon the sand pump being sent to their relief. The deputation was informed that action would be taken at once.

A deputation from Willowdale Park asked that the Dominion Government be appealed to to take another site for the projected armory for the Queen's Own Rifles, so that the rounding out of Willowdale Park will not be interfered with. The proposition to the government will be to accept another site from the city for the armory and turn over to the city the site at Willowdale Park, donated by Sir Henry Pellatt.

Risk and Wickert made an effort to prevent Playground Supervisor McGillicuddy from being sent to Chicago to study playground supervision there, because of objection by two members of the advisory committee on standardization of playground supervision in the city. There was a majority vote for the commissioner's recommendation to send Mr. McGillicuddy, but the commissioner has decided not to send him.

Chairman Anderson suggested that there be a comparative scheme for raising the level of the ground of the islands, the high level of the water this year showing the danger of serious damage to property there. All the members favored asking Commissioner Chambers to bring in a report.

LONDON, April 28.—(C. A. P.)—The London Daily News, editorially discussing the celebration of the England-U. S. A. peace centenary, says: "Next year's commemoration will bring this country into complete sympathy, not only with the United States, but with Canada. It is important to remember, as has profound interest in Anglo-American peace relations, that we have her borders march for thousands of miles side by side with those of the United States and not a part of a gun or a sentry serves to testify of the triumph of civilized relationship than this."

But if you are raising peaches in city streets, in meager back yards, in offices and factories, transplant them immediately to the soil—get a little farm to raise
