PARIS, May 18 .- Reports from Contantinople confirm the discovery of a plot organized by Armenians and Turks opposed to the new regime to assassinate the Sultan, Enver Pasha, Field Marshal Von Der Gotz and Gen. Liman Von Sanders, telegraphs The Journal's Athens correspondent. The correspondent declares 400 Ar menians have been arrested and that their fate is unknown, while Kurds have been given orders to burn two large villages near Van.

The sole head of a ramny, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Subagency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within in miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions.

A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
