

charges has very little to rest upon. The medical profession of this Province is peculiarly free the spirit of greed as manifested by overcharging for medical or surgical attendance. The very few examples of this sort of thing may safely be left to the care of the ordinary Courts. An eminent engineer may charge thousands of dollars for a single opinion, and a leading lawyer hundreds of dollars a day for attendance at Court. Too much legislation may become a positive danger.

#### **XII. The So-called Colleges.**

The recommendations of the Commissioner regarding the so-called Colleges, on pages 65 and 66, should become law at the earliest moment. All such concerns should be closed up. They can only do harm to the real cause of education, and especially medical education.

#### **XIII. Midwives.**

The stand of the Commissioner on midwives is correct. There is no need whatever for the recognition of such at present. To legalize them would be a backward step, as there is no need for such a class of practitioners. See page 67 of the report.
