The French Commander upon having Intelligence of their Arrival at Annapolis, and their Embarkation for Minas, had quitted the District and retired with his Party to Schiegnecto, the extreme Part of the Peninsula: The Scason being extremely severe hindered the New England Men from immediately following him thither, as the commanding Officer had Orders to do; so that they determined to wait till the Rigour of it was abated.

On the last Day of January the French Commander having gained Intelligence of their being distributed in Quarters at a great Distance from each other, and being secretly encouraged with the Promise of Assistance from some of the Inhabitants, made a March, which was thought impracticable in that Seafon of the Year, through the Woods with a Party of Canadians and Indians; and taking the Advantage of a violent Snow Storm, which had lasted 36 Hours, entered the Town immediately after, at Midnight, and surrounded most of them in their Quarters; the greatest Part of whom were killed, wounded or taken Prisoners: In the mean time, those Parties which were not furrounded, marched out and forced their Way through the Enemy to the Guard-House, being a large defensible Stone Building, fituated in the middle of the Town; and some others, which had been surrounded, beat off the Party which attacked them and recovered it: The next Morning two Companies marched out of the Guard-House ato make
