The vulgar either stand aloof in stupid amazement, branding us with the names of Fool and Madman; or admiring us the more, because they comprehend us not; sollow us in crowds, as the parish did the Greek Preacher in the Spectator, and content themselves, if they do not understand the sense, with being able to love and honour the sound. The former perhaps may have been my case, the latter has been undoubtedly yours. You have dealt about your Hand-bills with better fortune, and in a more conspicuous station; I
