of federation all round. Nationalists, he said, accepted the bill as a final settlement of the international quarrel between England and Ireland, and when they voted for it they were not only voting for Ireland, but for those in Canada, the United States, New Zealand and Australia.

From the point of view of foreign policy and military strength of Great Britain, home rule was the most urgent step that could be made for safeguarding the British Isles.

Bonar Law's Onslaught

Andrew Bonar Law, leader of the opposition assailed the bill fiercely. The government, he said, was setting up a new union, not to create a union, but to destroy the union which already existed. He denounced the bill as a "staggering" and "utterly futile" attempt to force the financial provisions of the bill on the people of Ireland.

Every new parliament of inexperienced men, said the speaker, had tried to get the million in a hurry. The new Irish parliament would launch all sorts of schemes for improving the condition of the country, borrowing money for the purpose. As a result the imperial parliament would be liable for a huge capital sum it would not have sanctioned and for expenditures over which it had practically no control.

Ireland Torn Asunder

Referring to the example of South Africa, which had been cited to justify home rule in Ireland, Mr. Law said that in South Africa the two races wanted union, but that one of the two races, the white, was not only opposing home rule, but was also opposing the union which had been proposed.

Referring to the Uster threats, Mr. Aquith said that he believed the British people to be just and generous. They rejected intolerance and persecution in any form, but they were not the people to be frightened out of what they believed to be just, by language of intimidation.

The government had asked repeatedly what further safeguards were desired, but the only answer of the opposition was that they would receive from Ulster nothing but unyielding and uncompromising resistance.

Dealing with the safeguards, the premier said if the Irish parliament should act in a manner which the government had set, these acts became void. No one was bound to obey them; no one could be punished for disobeying them. The bill was final in the sense that it was the settlement of a long standing warfare, but no one could be punished for disobeying it, that there might not be a necessity hereafter to modify some of its provisions, or that they were not going to proceed further in the path of devolution.

In conclusion, Premier Aquith said that the claim of Ireland was of paramount urgency because there was no part of the United Kingdom to which the imperial parliament owed so long and so deep a debt.

John Robinson, on leaving parliament with his wife shortly after Mr. Aquith was also loudly cheered, many Irishmen in the crowd singing "A Nation Once Again."

EARTHQUAKES IN MEXICO.

GUADALAJARA, Mex., May 8.—(Can. Press.)—(Delayed in transmission.)—More than a dozen earthquakes were felt here, at intervals from 6:30 o'clock this morning up to 3:30 this evening. The last shock was the most severe, and several adobe houses were damaged. No injuries to persons here have been reported, but many were greatly alarmed and thousands were passing the night outdoors, in the plaza and in gardens. There is an unconfirmed rumor that some persons were killed at Tepic.

Fishery Disputes Settled.

NEW YORK, May 9.—(Can. Press.)—Hon. J. Douglas Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries for Canada, was in this city to-day on his way home from a conference with the authorities at Washington over the fisheries regulation. The negotiations were so satisfactory that they will be continued by mail and will probably be closed within a very short time. All the Canadian representatives in the conference are now on their way home, but Sir Edward P. Morris, the premier of Newfoundland, who represented his country in the negotiations, is detained at Washington by the illness of his wife.

CITY WILL ISSUE FIVE MILLION DEBENTURES

City Treasurer to Leave for England Shortly—Mayor May Accompany Him—Work Undertaken Will Require \$17,000,000, But Only Part Will Be Borrowed Now.

In order to float debentures totaling at least \$5,000,000, City Treasurer Coady will probably journey to England during the latter part of the month and there is a possibility that Mayor Geary will accompany him. The city has undertaken work during the past two years which will necessitate issuing debentures to the extent of nearly \$17,000,000, but it is likely that a loan for only a small part of this sum will be made at the present time, unless the market is found particularly favorable.

Germany May Put Ban on Dueling

Berlin, May 9.—(Can. Press.)—The Clericals have introduced a resolution in the reichstag asking the imperial chancellery, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, to take steps to end dueling in the army, particularly the practice that makes it compulsory for an offended person to challenge the offender or leave the army.

Duff, minister of agriculture, paid a visit to-day to the Ontario Agricultural College, accompanied by a government architect who took a look over the grounds available for the location of the new buildings to be erected soon. It is understood that tenders will be called for in a few days.

JURY DISAGREED

The jury in the case of Walter Truro, charged with the murder of his wife, Esther David, came up before Mr. Justice Middleton yesterday. Dr. Hanna Emily Reid, the family physician, stated that she examined Mrs. David, but did not think until several days later, that an operation had been performed.

OPERATION PERFORMED

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NAVIGATION MERGER COMPLETED

The merger of the Inland Navigation Co. with the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co. has been completed, according to information obtained yesterday. The R. & O. made a straight purchase of the other company, paying 120 for the Inland stock, the total price paid being between a million and a half and two million dollars. The authorized capital of the R. & O. Company is \$5,000,000.

LOUISIANA FLOODS LESS DANGEROUS

NEW ORLEANS, May 9.—(Can. Press.)—Other than the rescued marooned persons in the overflowed sections and the closing of an incipient crevasse at Ilyria, near the mouth of the Mississippi River, the Louisiana flood situation to-day was without incident. Workmen in depressed numbers were engaged at nearly all doubtful places between Natchez and New Orleans, taking advantage of the fair weather, in strengthening the embankments.
