The mistake has been made in giving too much money to the boxers. This is admitted on all sides, yet there seems to be no remedy in sight. Instead of working in harmony, the various promoters have followed a cut-throat policy which, in many cases, has brought about complete fallure.

Second and third-rate boxers have been allowed to distate exorbitant terms. Some of them have received as much as \$2000 or \$3000 for their services, which, under other conditions would have been worth \$500. 
