This is what Christy Mathewson told a crowd of youngsters a while ago when they appealed to him for advice on how to become a successful pitcher:
"Aim for control beyond everything telse. You may have the most wonderful curves in existence and speed greater than Walter Johnson, but what good will they do you if you can't get them near a smough to the plate to force a batter to swing?

"Perfect the overhand delivery. You probably will be ab'e to pu more on the ball at first with the ound arm delivery that some pitchers us—but you can't be sure of control in hat way. Don't worry if the bitters o hit you rather freely at first when using the overhand throw. Keep at if In time of the overhand that you can place the ball where you want to—and that's the thing.

"Use your brains by studying the batters. Always memorize what kind of ball that fellow couldn't hit the first time up and be sure to feed him more of the same kind. If he did hit the first time up, don't give him the same kind of ball again. Try him on something else. "But don't always aim to str'ke out a man. It's a terrific strain on the arm to try to pitch strikes all the time." Hemember that you have seven men back of you—and they are ever ready to help you."
