Wish to Extend Their Line to Mount Pleasant

BY WAY OF AVENUE-ROAD.

Application Made to the York Township Council Yesterday.

Company Promises One Fare and the Equal Treatment of the Township to Keep Its Portion of the Line in Repair After Discussion It Is Resolved to Hold a Special Meeting to Consider the Project.

The regular monthly meeting of the council was held yesterday at the Town Hall, North Toronto. All the members were present. The first business was the report of the committee on the petition of the Mount Pleasant Road Association, asking for a right of way over the railway line from the Toronto Company to the Mount Pleasant Road. The committee reported that they had been in communication with the Toronto Company and that they had been promised one fare and equal treatment of the township to keep its portion of the line in repair after discussion it is resolved to hold a special meeting to consider the project.

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CROPS IN MARKHAM TOWNSHIP.

Prospects of an Abundant Harvest—The Damage by the Recent Storm.

The world's agricultural reporter spent his holiday yesterday visiting some of the farms adjacent to the villages of Richmond Hill and Thornhill in the Township of Markham.

Although the recent rain has done a great deal of damage, he found that it was not nearly so bad as was at first reported.

Of spring wheat there will be, generally speaking, a splendid crop, especially of the soft varieties, and of the farms which can be seen as the crops are overgrown.

From 30 to 40 bushels per acre. These are a splendid crop, and on nearly every farm corn is seen to be in good condition.

There are not generally a good crop, these having been so much injured by the spring frost. Although there are some good fields, still there will not be an average crop.

The corn and root crops are excellent in nearly every instance.

On the farm belonging to Mr. William Paton, at which is now annexed to his sons, George and Frank, there is a combination of corn and root crops.

Of the weather conditions for the future, the farmer, who will, after all the damage done by the recent storm, still reap an abundant harvest.
