Wheat—Was dull early, exhibiting to only a slight extent the activity later in the day, although the opening transactions were somewhat better than previous close. Corn market has again been a factor, though in a rather different way from past few days. The failure of wheat to respond to the weakness in corn seemed inclined to start an apprehensive feeling among holders of short contracts, and the volume of business being light it only required moderate buying to give the market a strong appearance. Then followed Bradstreet's report, showing a decrease in world's visible of about 6,750,000 bushels, also numerous reports of damage to the spring wheat crop in the west, which caused final advance. While these were the immediate causes probably, as advised before, we think the chief interest is centred in new receipts, and while to-day's have perhaps offered the best comparison against last year's at the same time, they were hardly such as to really base anything in the way of wholesale selling, and while we believe conditions, if continued, will eventually justify lower prices, we cannot look for much movement in that direction until receipts increase. There has been a fair demand for cash wheat, with slight improvement in the price, while low grade samples have been somewhat easier. Closing Liverpool and continental cables were steady, showing no decided strength. Export demand not urgent, and clearances rather light. Toledo has again been the principal wheat receiving centre to-day, receiving over 200,000 bushels.
