THEY TOOK A REST. Americans and Spaniards in Paris

Exchanged Calls - Personal Friendships Have Arisen. Paris, Dec. 11.-The United States Peace Commissioners rested to-day after the long Strain of daily conferences and almost daily Monson. In part he says: Slowly, but Commissioners rested to-day after the long strain of daily conferences and almost daily seessions with Spaniards, the intensity of which they hardly realized until it was all over. Warm, personal friendships and mutual regard have arisen between the two commissions as the result of their extended controversy at close quarters. To-day several members of both Commissions exchanged calls. The American Commissioners unofficially informed the Spaniards that they would be glad to have the two Commissions dine together. The reply, which, like the invitation, was conveyed diplomatically through a third party, was that the Spaniards would be most preased, but feared it would be lnadyiable, because it might be misconstrued at Madrid, where already much feeling existed against the Spaniar Commissioners. Several members of the American Commission were inclined at first to publish the text of the treaty, but Senator Faye made a strong plea yesterday for the observance of courtesy towards the United States Senate, and his arguments prevalled.
