MR. FORD ON THE SITUATION

Reason of No News Since Wednesday is That Roberts' Communications Have Been Cut.

NEWS GLOSSIP FROM LONDON BY CABLE ON SATURDAY

What to do With the South African Republics is Now the Topic in Britain—Roast on Lord Rosslyn—Stories of Mrs. Gladstone.

London, June 9.—The all-attentive and purposeful South African war, so far as the average Briton is concerned, is over. With the exception of the possible capture of President Kruger and the home-coming of Lord Roberts, his celebrated and probable already China is becoming a keen rival of South Africa as the burning question of the day. The capture of 500 members of the Imperial Yeomanry, which a few months ago would have thrown the nation into a fit of despondency, has passed comparatively unnoted. The work of stamping out the rebellion, for such, according to the British point of view, is the nature of the operation now encountered, is too prosaic and too common in the annals of the British army to merit the abhorring attention hitherto bestowed on each detail of the sanguinary struggle.

What Shall We Do With It?

"What shall we do with it?" is far more the topic of the hour than speculation regarding the expenditure in lives and money that seems likely to ensue before the pacification of the Boers shall be accomplished. It is a question that has been discussed in London since the prospects of the undeveloped Crown lands of Natal, while the rich resources of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony form the basis of the present articles. Before many months shall have passed the steamship companies plying to and from South Africa, the companies connected with the development of that portion of the globe and others equally interested and well-informed look for a large and steady emigration of transvaal agriculturists and others to fields on which the blood of Britain and Boer is scarcely dry.

Man Will Settle There

All the letters from the front indicate an increasing desire on the part of a large proportion of the irregular and colonial forces to settle down in this fertile land. The British High Commissioner, Sir Alfred Milner, it is learned, is devoting his whole attention to evolving a scheme of civil colonization applicable to the Orange River Colony, and is relying to a large extent upon the influence of the British settlers to carry it out.

Is the Navy Short Too?

Those who believe that the navy would be in a case of war, probably as full of ships as the South African campaign, are not alone in their views. Additional confirmation of their fears by reason of the serious strike in the Admiralty upon the irregularities of the target practice and reports thereon among the fleet now in commission. The Admiralty practically declares that the percentage of ships without superior gun commissions targets were not properly checked, and were not drawn from another ship.

Queen's Granddaughter Left Washington Late Yesterday for Ottawa. The Princess, who is accompanied by her lady-in-waiting, the Countess Chappin, left Washington yesterday afternoon for Ottawa, where she will be met by the President and Mrs. McKinley.

Capt. Bell, late A.D.C. to the Governor-General, who was in charge of the Maxim guns with the first Canadian contingent, is expected to arrive in Ottawa in a few days. He is retiring from the army after a career of enter service. He will resume his position as A.D.C. to Lord Minto.
