IS CHANGED ONLY IN NAME. Insurance Manager A. M. Featherston of the R.T. of T. Becomes Superintendent of Agencies.

SALARY IS PRACTICALLY THE SAME. Another Smallpox Case Appears in Hamilton—Board of Health Takes Action.

Hamilton, March 20.—At this morning's session of the Dominion Council of the Royal Templars an address on the prohibition question was delivered by Rev. Dr. Curran. This afternoon the reports on insurance and state extension of the order were presented and considered together in Committee of the Whole. The principal point concerned the proposed reorganization of the insurance department, now under A. M. Featherston. The discussion was resumed at this evening's session, when it was decided to appoint a special committee to arrive at some conclusion. The committee reported, recommending that the name of insurance manager be changed to superintendent of agencies, that there be a more intimate co-operation with the Grand Council and that the basis of the superintendent's salary be changed somewhat, but leaving it substantially the same. The report was adopted, and the following clauses in the two committee reports were passed.

This will leave a home force of 20,000 men, besides large bodies of militia, yeomanry and volunteers. India is to provide an army corps each of the three presidencies, and South Africa is expected to raise two army corps to be available for service where. To Canada are apportioned four militia army corps, which can be wholly mobilized, while Australia is supposed to raise two and New Zealand one army corps. There is also to be an extension of the system of garrison regiments, in which the royal marines will cooperate when they are removed from the ships.

Will Tour the Colonies. To help in recruiting some of the troops, a general tour of the colonies, and men will be free to join any branch of the army in any part of His Majesty's dominions, and will be sent at the public expense to join such army when opportunities occur. All the corps will be properly equipped with the latest pattern of artillery armament.

Here is a plan that will astonish Europe. But it is obvious that it can be put into operation too soon. India is to be reorganized the forces there, and the removal of Gen. Kitchener is needed in Africa for months to come. With China practically in revolt, with the Maldives, the Andamans, and the war in Afghanistan, where the Amir's army is fighting a stubborn fight, Turkey being a serious menace to the Balkans, and the Macedonian committee fomenting revolt in the Eastern Balkans, it can readily be discerned that the Balkan must needs look to her own defence.

FOUR THIEVES BURGLARY
