Prominent Business Man Led in

Burning of Two Negroes.

Statesboro, Ga., Aug. 19.—Without

any previous notice, a prominent business

man today admitted that he was the

leader of the mob that burned Paul

Reed and William Cato at the stake on

Wednesday, and further made the re-

markable assertion that he nor any

member of the lynch party had fear

of prosecution.

He averred that no judge or jury

would convict any man that took part

in the double lynching, and as practical

proof of his safety he told of the plans

having been perfected twenty-four

hours beforehand and boasted that the

lynchers had been carried out with-

out a hitch.

BELL REFUSES REQUEST

FOR BOOK EXAMINATION

Canvass for Subscribers for Municipal

Service to Be Begun

Next Week.

Brantford, Aug. 19.—(Special.)—The

special telephone committee on the

quest for information to day asked to

see the books of the Bell Company, so

far as the Brantford business was con-

cerned. Their request was rejected.

The general opinion throughout the city

is that Mr. Scott, the Bell expert, will

not accept the challenge and address

favoring municipal ownership to ap-

pear on a public platform and de-

bate the question.

The aldermen who are behind the

public ownership of the telephone

scheme are in receipt of many letters

daily giving information and advice

regarding the best way to fight the

Bell monopoly. One letter received by

Ald. Andrews from the manager of an

independent telephone company in

Prince Edward County, advised him

of the telephone company's interest in

municipal ownership of the phones before

giving a competitive franchise.

It is very probable that a representa-

tive will be sent out to secure sub-

scribers to the municipal scheme early

next week. The committee favoring the

telephone committee favor such action,

and it is likely the rest will swing

into line.

RESIDENTS OPPOSE STREET CLOSING

Purchase of O'Hara-Avenue by Gutter

Percha Co. to Go to Council.

A meeting was held at 114 O'Hara-

avenue last night to protest against the

absorption of the northern end of the

street by the Gutter Percha and

Rubber Co. Nearly two-thirds of the

interested property owners were pres-

ent, and a number of absentees were

represented by counsel, Ald. Graham

and McChie had no hesitation in say-

ing it would be a grave injustice to let

the street as it was distinctively resi-

dential and closing it would almost

entirely destroy the character of the

street. The aldermen present were im-

pressed with the views of the meeting

and decided to engage legal talent

if necessary to prosecute the opposition

to the scheme. The thanks of the

meeting were tendered to Ald. Mc-

Chie and Graham for their interest in

the matter. J. E. Rankin presided.

on both sides of the street for a con-

siderable distance south of the railway

tracks, and it is said, desires to run

in a trench from Brock-avenue across

the street.
