THE SULTAN SUBMITS. Candia, Island of Crete, Sept. 15. -Admiral Noel, the British naval commander here, handed Edem Pasha, the Turkish governor, yesterday evening a demand for the disarmament of the Mussulman population. The Pasha is awaiting the advice of the Turkish

Government on the subject. The foreign admirals have rejected the Turkish proposal to appoint a mixed commission to fix responsibility

for the recent riots. Candia, Sept. 19.-The sultan has ordered Djevad Pasha, the military commander in Crete, to accede to the demands of the British admiral, Gerard Henry Noel, for disarmament, thus complying with the whole ultimatum of the admiral. A British military detachment today occupied the entrance to the forts, and it is rumored that the Ottoman troops will be withdrawn and a British force will occupy the town. Among the prisoners already handed over to Admiral Noel are two who are credited with being ringleaders in the attack on the British camp.

FRANCE IS CONCILIATORY. London, Sept. 19.-From Cairo and from an entirely independent source, the Daily Mail learns that France has assumed a conciliatory attitude towards Great Britain, and has declared that the expedition of M. Marchand is quite unofficial. The Sirdar will offer to take Major Marchand to Cairo, and it is probable that the major will

accept and that Fashoda will be occupied by Egyptian troops. TRY TO RETAIN THE PHILIP-

PINES London, Sept. 19.—The Daily Mail's Madrid correspondent says a long conference was held between Senor Sagasta, the premier, and Senor Mon-tero Rios, the president of the Spanish peace commission, today which resulted in the decision that the peace commission shall strenuously defend the retention of the Philippine Islands

by Spain. ENGLISH BYE-ELECTION, London, Sept. 19.—The election held Saturday for the seat in parliament made vacant by the death of Mr. Arthur Pease, Liberal-Unionist, resulted in the return of Mr. Pike Pease, the Liberal-Unionist candidate, by a majority of 1,408 votes over his Liberal opponent, Mr. Owen C. Phillips. The vote was: Mr. Pike Pease, 3,497; Mr. Owen C. Phillips, 3,039—Liberal-Unionist majority, 1,408.

At the last election Mr. Arthur Pease was returned by 3,354 votes against 2,697 cast for Sir Theodore Fry,

the home rule candidate. ACTIVITY OF MOUNT VESUVIUS. Rome, Sept. 19 .-- The activity of Mount Vesuvius is increasing. Deep rumblings and explosions are heard in the crater, and these are followed by the vomiting forth of great quantities of lava and ashes. A torrent of lava half a mile wide is flowing near the crater. A little way down the mountain the stream divides into three branches from 20 to 50 yards wide, with a velocity of 35 yards an hour. All the villages in the neighborhood ere sprinkled with ashes. Some of the wells have dried up. Many pine groves and vineyards have been destroyed.

The spectacle at night is magnificent. THE FRENCH CRISIS. Paris, Sept. 18 .- Le Soir says that Gen. Chanoine, the newly appointed war minister, told friends that he re-

garded himself as a sentinel relieving another charged with watching over the army's rights, and intimated that as he was appointed after the first cabinet council of Saturday, he was not responsible for the decisions reported at the council, when it was determined to submit the documents in the Dreyfus case to a commission to be selected by the minister of justice. He declared that should any attempt be made under a pretext of a revision of the Dreyfus proceedings, to engage in maneuvers against the army he would immediately resign. A majority of the Paris papers approve of the cabinet's decision, which is looked upon as the first definite step taken towards revision. A few unim-portant street demonstrations oc-

curred last night. AID AND SYMPATHY.

London, Sept. 19.—Queen Victoria has sent to the governor of Barbadoes a message of sympathy with the sufferers from the hurricane, and Colonial Secretary Chamberlain has done likewise from the United States, where

he is now on a visit. The governor of Barbadoes has renewed his appeal for aid. He cables that three-quarters of the people are without shelter or food, and that they are crowding into the populous centers, which will not accommodate their own inhabitants.

Cargoes of food have been ordered to supply the immediate wants of the sufferers, but the relief must be continuous, and must be kept up for a long time to come.

at hard labor. WANTS TO PLEASE. Berlin, Sept. 19.—The approaching visit of Emperor William to Turkey is now arousing considerable interest. The sultan is making extraordinary efforts to please the emperor during the latter's stay in Constantinople. The palace intended for his reception is being fitted up with lavish luxury. The decorations alone will cost 1500,000 marks. Emperor William will stay about twelve days at Constantinople. The Turkish troops, it is asserted, are somewhat dissatisfied on the subject, as their arrears of pay have been de-

voted to the expense of Emperor Williams's visit. The preparations at Jerusalem for the visit of the emperor are in full swing. Streets are being cut through swing. Streets are being cut through the city and the regular mountains of rubbish in the bazar quarters have been removed. The garrison of Jerusalem is especially active in drilling in order to impress the emperor, though many of them are barefooted and wear nondescript uniforms, while the officers are little better clad. All of these soldiers, however, are to receive new uniforms for the festivities organized in honor of the visit of Em-

them are dying. IN THE TOMB

Interment of the Empresss of Austria's

Remains in the Imperial Mausoleum. Vienna, Sept. 19.—The funeral of the late Empress of Austria was celebrated on Saturday with impressive ceremonies. An imposing procession proceeded slowly from the Hofburg Chapel to the Church of Capuchins. The buildings along the route were deeply draped with black, and the streets were crowded with people bearing mourning emblems. The funeral car was, drawn by eight horses, and was fol-lowed by a large force of troops and a long train of dignitaries, court servants and footmen bearing lighted tapers.
The church was draped with black, and the Cardinal-Archbishop of Vienna, Mgr. Gruscha, officiated. The services were brief, and when they were finished the casket was lifted from the catafalque and born down the stairs away to the vaults, where the final benediction was pronounced. Emperor Francis Joseph, Prince Hohenlohe, the German imperial chancellor, and Baron Von Buelow, the German minister for foreign affairs, received Emperor William at the railroad station. The emperors shook hands and kissed each other's cheeks three times. They then proceeded to the church, where Emperor William, in behalf of himself and the Empress of Germany, deposited on the casket a floral wreath, which his majesty had brought from Germany. Great torches threw glaring flames over the royal chapel, in which the remains of the late empress laid in state since Friday morning. The doors of the chapel were closed at noon, thus

barring out thousands of people who were anxious to see the casket. While the procession was being formed the church was filled with the foreign princes, who arrived without ostentation in closed carriages. Outside a company of distinguished generals and staff officers were aligned. The foot guards and horse guards, followed by a detachment of yeomen, all gor-geously uniformed, preceded the colossal eight-horsed funeral car. On either side of it were four footmen and four pages, with lighted tapers, but the immediate escort of the car was composed of six stalwart gentlemen of the Arther Guards, eight yeomen, six Hungarian Life Guards, and eight Mounted Life Guards. Following the car were several bodies of infantry and cavalry. A large number of priests in full

canonicals met the procession at the Augustine's Church, and proceeded with it to the Church of the Capuchins. During the last prayer the coffin was lifted from the catafalque, and the clergy, bearing torches, walked before it. Emperor Francis Joseph, attended by the highest officers of state, followed. This procession slowly passed from the sight of the congregation down a stone stairway to the vaults.

Dealt With by the Conference at Winniger

Employment of Japanese, Treatment of Stokers, Long Hours and Other

Topics Taken Up.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 19.—At the sitting of the labor conferees, resolutions were introduced in reference to the employment of Japanese, the treatment of stokers on steamships, the insufficient wages, long hours and lack of system of promotion for letter carriers; the increase of taxation per head of Chinamen entering the Dominion from \$50 to \$500; the inspection of stationary boilers; the copyright law, and the manufacture of books in the Dominion; the hours of labor in mines in British Columbia; the necessity for one day's rest in seven in mines where seven days are now exacted; the inadequate number of inspectors of Ontario factories; prison reform; the abolition of the property qualification for aldermen; the adoption of a law to bring union labor under the Trades Mark act, and the printing of the evidence taken by the Crow's nest commission.

Mr. O'Donoghue presented a petition from the local union of the United Garment Workers of America, setting

forth their grievances.

Mr. Appleton presented a petition complaining of a system of payment on the Canadian Pacific Railway. It represented that certain employes were paid \$40 per month, to earn which they must work 260 hours—10 hours a day for 26 days. If they work 300 hours, they receive no more than \$40, but if they are not required to work 260 hours deduction is made from the

financial report, showing total ceipts \$535 11, and a balance, after deducting expenses, of \$140 79, including \$100 received from the American Federation of Labor. Communications were received from

A. Roberts, secretary journeymen tailors, St. Thomas, submitting a resolution relating to a communication from outside merchant tailors, and from the Guelph, Ont., iron molders' union, asking that steps be taken to have rescinded the intimidation bill which is being used against the workingmen in conducting strikes.

Delegate Stewart moved that the existing property qualification for the office of aldermen should be abolished, as it is inconsistent with a free repre-sentative system of self-government. Delegate Payne moved that the congress request the Dominion Government to print both the findings and the evidence of the Crow's Nest commission, and that a copy be supplied to all labor organizations in the Do-

OUR BIRTH RATE

Sensational Charges by Rev. Dr. Wil. liams-Accusations Against Ontario Women.

Montreal, Sept. 19-The motion made by Rev. Dr. Williams, of Strathroy, for a committee to inquire into th causes of the low birth rate in Ontario was considered by the Anglican Synod yesterday. Dr. Williams, in support of the motion, made some very strong statements. He said that from inquiries he had made from people in a position to know, he had been informed that the low birth rate was largely due to many women in Ontario doing things they should not do, and using means to prevent their having children. He had been informed that this practice was alarmingly common, and he thought the matter should be look. ed into.

The motion for a committee to inquire into the subject was carried.
