

LOAN AUTHORITIES CANCEL NUMBERS DROPPED LAST NIGHT

One Man Got 500 Numbers
When Pamphlets Accident-
ally Drop.

Victory Loan authorities have decided to cancel the numbers on all of the pamphlets which were accidentally dropped in one bundle last evening. Immediately after the performance of Aerial Peris, the trapeze artist, to make amends to the crowd which was on the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets last night, a double quantity of the pamphlets will be distributed this evening.

The strong wind, which chilled the performer on his high platform and the large assemblage of spectators below, was largely responsible for the accident concerning the pamphlets. When Mr. Peris had completed his last feat, hundreds of the pamphlets were placed in a basket on the sidewalk, which was tied to a long rope, and by which it was to be sent to the distribution point. But when the basket was pulled up about half the distance, it was caught by the wind and the rope, and in the effort made to free the resultant jam, the handle of the basket was broken and the pamphlets fell in a bundle on the pavement below. Several Victory Loan officials, who were watching the proceedings, and who anticipated the accident, secured the assistance of three policemen in an effort to clear the sidewalk immediately below the basket before it fell.

Crowd Rushes for Papers.
They were successful for a few seconds—until the bundle hit the ground. Then a tremendous rush of excited citizens, making a scramble that any football team could never hope to equal, carried the policemen off their feet and a wild fight for the papers containing the numbers was made for several minutes. The people were forced to realize that a continued struggle was useless however, through the presence of mind of one of the policemen. He secured the handle of the basket and holding it high over his head, shouted: "This is all that is left."

Sergeant Fred Young, on behalf of the Victory Loan executive, announced that all of the numbers which fell would be cancelled, as the numbers are known at headquarters. Speaking to the crowd he said: "We wish to inform the bullies in the scrimmage tonight, and particularly the man I saw with two bundles of the papers, that they are not one bit ahead of the game. He then announced that a cancellation of the numbers would be made, and received hearty applause from the assembled people.

During the evening Victory Bonds were sold in the G. T. R. ticket office on the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets by F. H. Butler, who sold bonds worth \$1,000 by the telephone alone. For every bond purchased at that office a pamphlet containing three numbers for the contest to end next Saturday will be given.

PUBLIC SCHOOL PRINCIPALS LEFT BEHIND IN SALARY RACE; HEADS OF COLLEGIATE DEPARTMENTS HIGHER

Latter Given \$500 Rise, Former, Who Have Reached Maximum, Get Nothing, Although Formerly Placed On Same Level.

The salaries of Principal W. H. T. Mooney of the collegiate institute, and Principal H. B. Beal of the technical school, were placed at \$2,200 by the board of education yesterday. The salaries for heads of departments in both the collegiate and technical school were placed at \$2,700, or \$500 more than the maximum salary of a public school principal. They were formerly at the same level, \$2,200.

As this maximum has been raised, all the teachers in these schools will benefit by the bonus which the board granted. But as some public school principals have reached the maximum limit of \$2,200 they will get no benefit whatever, although in the former salary schedule they were placed on the same basis as the teachers in the technical and high schools.

Trustee Rowe replied to question by Trustee Coleridge, that these teachers have high qualifications than the public school principals.

The salary of Miss Manley, physical instructor for high school girls, will be \$1,600, and that of Mr. Syme, physical instructor for the boys, \$1,700. In future the minimum salary of high school teachers will be made in accordance with their qualifications and successful record in the past.

This will enable it to get better teachers.

Principal H. B. Beal reported that the attendance at the technical school

in October was 146 enrolled; 132 daily average attendance, and an aggregate attendance of 2,782. There was an average attendance of 356 at the evening classes. The registration for the evening and special afternoon classes was reported most satisfactory, with 844 students taking 1,261 classes.

Collegiate Attendance.
Principal Mooney reported 314 pupils on the general roll at the collegiate, and 241 on the commercial roll.

There is an average attendance of 864 in the general and 228 in the commercial. In 1918 there was an average attendance of 715 general and 166 commercial. In the night school 120 pupils are enrolled, compared to 108 last year. The average attendance, however, is only 74, compared to 91 last year. Two new rooms have been opened in the commercial building. The teachers for these appointed pro tem are Mrs. Laird, wife of a returned medical officer, a fully certified teacher, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, and Miss Cannell at \$450 a day.

Public School Inspector Edwards reported 8,088 pupils on the public school rolls, compared to 7,945 last year, an increase of 143. The average attendance last month was 7,265, compared to 7,117 last year.

A recent prophylactic clinic 383 cases were examined and 371 cases were treated. Eighty-seven per cent of the pupils examined had defective teeth.

EXCAVATION WORK ON MEDICAL SCHOOL NEARING COMPLETION

The Foundation Work May Be Covered by January.

HOUSE CLASSES IN FALL
Plans Include Auditorium To
Seat 500 People and
Gymnasium.

Despite the fact that local citizens voted only \$100,000 last January toward the erection of a new medical school here, work of excavation for a \$300,000 structure has been begun at the corner of Waterloo street and Ottawa avenue. A. Cope & Sons of Hamilton have received the excavation contract, and a steam shovel is on the job nibbling away at the site of the basement for the west wing being excavated last week. While the shovel is today clearing the way for the east wing, the final contract for the new building has not been signed, owing to minor details which must be settled. But John Petherbridge, a local contractor, is proceeding with the work and has sub-let the excavation contract to the Hamilton firm.

Will Take Subscription.
It is planned by the Western University board of governors to raise funds by subscriptions to make up the additional \$200,000 deficit, and it is hoped that the provincial authorities will grant financial assistance in the near future.

The site of the new building was purchased years ago by the board of governors. Dr. P. S. McKibben, acting dean of Western University Medical School, the work will be continued throughout the winter, it being the intention of the contractor to have the foundation work covered by January next, so the interior work will not be held up by the weather. Dr. McKibben yesterday informed The Advertiser that several classrooms in the new school will be available for occupation when the college term begins in October, and that the phase relative congestion at the present medical school, owing to large junior classes of returned soldiers, will be relieved.
