Just What Progress Valuators Are Making Is Unknown As Also Are Numbers of Those At Work.

"There is no official assurance yet that the valuation of the street railway will be completed in time for a vote of the electors to be taken on the matter of the purchase of the road." Mayor Somerville stated today.

The hydro valuators are still working on the road. If the work is to be completed in time it must be turned into the special railway committee before the end of this week, so that that body may consider it and send it to the councit.
