ONTARIO CLUBS DECIDE TO STICK WITH MICHIGAN END

M.-O. Goes On Record As Opposed To Lasker Plan - Split Schedule Discussed, But No Action Taken - Battle Creek Promise Big Stadium For Next Season.

DETROIT. Oct. 31.—Going on record at the directors' meeting here today as opposed to the Lasker plan for re-organization of baseball, the Michigan-Ontario League decided to operate next season without any change of the cirsident George H. Maines presentd his annual report, after conferring with President Ban Johnson of the merican League, President Heydler of the National League, and other asseball dignitaries at Chicago. The baseball dignitaries at Chicago. The Mint League occupies a very prominent place in minor league circles, and was the first organization to offer to the National Association its assistance in the effort to rehabilitate the game, other than the proposed Lasker plan. The matter of splitting the schedule next season was briefly discussed and will be taken up again in January. It is proposed to give the winning team of each half \$1,000 of league funds. Alternative plans were discussed.

The Battle Creek Club announced that it is prepared to build a modern stadium. Jacob Weick-

genant informed the directors that the Battle Creek Club will dispose of its franchise if the league advocates such action. There is no inclination to oust this club, but its management was given permission to negotiate with several prospective buyers before the annual meeting in January. The Michigan members of the circuit asked for a showdown as to the attitude of Ontario clubs regarding continuance of the league as an intrenational circuit. The Michiganders have been given to understand by a section of the Ontario press that the continuance of the relationship existing since the organization of the league was no longer desired. The Ontario section assured the Michigan men that they were desirous of proceeding as in 1919 and 1920. President Geo. H. Maines, Judge Clement, president of the Saginaw Club, and Secretary-Treasurer Frederick Wilson will represent the league at the annual meeting of the National Association in Kansas City, Nov. 8, 9 and 10.
