VOTING ON THREE BYLAWS ONE CARRIES, TWO DON'T

Second Ward Majority Ensured the Passing of the Street Railway Agreement.

HAMILTON, Sept. 16.—(Special).—The vote by wards on the street railway bylaw to-day was as follows:

It will be seen that it has a majority in wards 1, 2 and 3, and was defeated in wards 4, 5, 6 and 7. The 117 majority given in ward 2 was what carried it.

Two other bylaws submitted at the same time were defeated. One was to raise \$300,000 for good roads, to be laid in connection with the new railway system. It was defeated by 265. The vote by wards on it was:

An interesting and unusual case will be heard at police court Thursday morning, under the amendments made recently by the government to the License Act. The principal in it are John Warren, 135 East Strachan-street, and Richard Tobin, 118 North Bay-street, who were arrested to-night on the charge of selling liquor. They are on License Inspector Birrell's "list" of persons who may not be supplied with liquor, and they were prosecuted by the inspector. Pressure will likely be brought to bear upon them to divulge the source of their supply and the curfew will also be prosecuted.

Canon Curran Dead.

Word was received to-day of the death of Colville rectory, Nottingham, Eng., of Rev. Canon Curran, formerly rector of St. Thomas Church.

As an outcome of the suit for \$30,000 started by John E. Webb against the St. Mary's and Western Ontario Railway, Mr. Webb's brother has started another suit against the company, William Box and H. L. Rice, for unpaid damages for alleged wrongful distraint in connection with a farm John E. Webb had rented.

SOLD HYPOTHECATED BRICK.

And Will Serve 18 Months in Prison for Fraud.

WHITBY, Ont., Sept. 16.—(Special).—The criminal case of William Lowe of Oshawa, charged with obtaining valuable securities under false pretences, occupied the assizes. Chief Justice Falconbridge presiding. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and Lowe was sentenced to 18 months in prison.

Lowe was a brickmaker and sold to John Stacey 100,000 bricks that were hypothecated to the Western Bank. Denison, K. C., acted for prosecution; D. Burke Simpson, K.C., for defence.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

Revolver Picked Up in Street Fatal to Aged Man.

MONTCLAIR, N. J., Sept. 16.—John Leonard, a retired iron and steel merchant, was fatally shot under peculiar circumstances, at his home here to-day.

Walker Phillips, Leonard's private secretary, on his way to the house found a revolver in the street, and it exploded in his hand while he was examining it. The bullet entered his body over the heart and Mr. Leonard died before a doctor could reach the house.

Phillips, who is more than 50 years of age, was placed under arrest, but the police are inclined to credit his story. The two men were alone when the accident occurred, but Mrs. Leonard and a maid were in an adjoining room, and they say they heard no evidence of a quarrel.

THE DEAD ARE WITNESSES.

I do not believe that the dead depart. They are with us, closer and nearer than they ever were before, says William T. Stead.

The first cry that the average man makes in the presence of alleged supernatural phenomena is that of fraud, and on the whole he is abundantly justified. The history of mediumship is one long, disheartening record of fraud and exposure. That nearly all alleged spiritualistic phenomena are fraudulent there isn't the slightest doubt. That every "medium" who advertises "advice" for sale is an arrant rascal, may be taken as a foregone conclusion. That some of the most noted mediums, after months and sometimes years of scientific co-operation, have turned out to be impostors, is true.

But if we immediately dismiss in disgust the whole subject we are gravely in danger of the opposite error. When Dr. Thomson, day Hudson, author of "The Law of Psychic Phenomena," himself an opponent of the extreme spiritualistic position and an ethical writer of weight, says, "The man who denies the phenomena of spiritualism to-day is not entitled to be called a skeptic; he is simply ignorant," and when the great English scientist, Alfred Russel Wallace, the codiscoverer with Darwin of evolution, recently said, "No more evidence is needed to prove spiritualism, for no accepted fact in science has a greater or stronger array of proof in its behalf," does it not behoove the man in the street at least to read before scoffing?

In fact, now there are in all the world but one or two scientists of the first rank who deny the actual probability of the future life; while a large proportion claim that this life has been actually proved by the occurring phenomena of spiritualism.
