HEADING FOR FAR NORTH

New Yorker to Explore the Great Slave Country.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Captain B. S. Osborn, secretary of the Arctic Club of America, received the following cable message yesterday from Harry V. Radford, who is on a voyage of exploration in the Arctic regions. It is dated Edmonton, Alberta, June 1: "Left Edmonton to-day for the north, carrying thirty-six pieces of baggage, weighing fourteen hundred pounds, including a nineteen-foot cedar canoe, going by wagon trail for a hundred miles, and boat from Athabasca to Slave Rivers. Shall spend several months in the vicinity of Great Slave Lake searching for and studying the wood bison before proceeding to the Arctic. Expect to be absent three years."

The chronicler was endeavoring to make his story past ages something more than a mere dry record of dates and facts. No doubt this was why he wrote: "All along the coast would stream overtake them that would their footsteps until it strangles them (loud applause)."
