GIFT OF \$10,000 FOR JEFFRIES

Billy Brady Gets Credit for Offer for Fight With Kaufman.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The Herald this morning printed a story that is likely to turn out correct.

William A. Brady, who formerly managed James J. Jeffries, made an offer last night to give the retired heavyweight champion \$10,000 as a gift if he will fight A. Kaufman within ninety days.

Brady, who has had a serious falling out with his old protegee, has said time and again that he believed Kaufman could beat Jeffries, and to give evidence of the sincerity of his ideas of the merits of the former and the latter after his long retirement, Brady posted \$10,000 with Max Blumenthal, to be given to Jeffries, with no strings whatsoever attached, if he will go ten rounds against Kaufman.

No stipulation is made as to the event of Jeffries being beaten. Under the agreement, which was made
