

LAURIER ENDORSES MANY CANDIDATES

Sir Wilfrid Approves Four
Contestants for Toronto
Seats.

SOME UNDECIDED

Liberal Leader Hesitates in
Acting Concerning Hamil-
ton Constituencies.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier this evening gave out the list of candidates he has endorsed, for the purpose of overseas voting. The list does not include all the opposition candidates in the field. In a few constituencies the opposition leader has refused from endorsing any candidates. These constituencies are as follows:

Grey North, where W. S. Middlebro, Conservative Unionist, and Dr. Dandridge, Liberal Unionist, are the candidates; Hastings West, where E. G. Porter, Conservative Unionist, and E. J. Graham, Independent Conservative Unionist, are opponents; North York, where W. A. Channing, Unionist Liberal, and J. A. Walker, an independent candidate, Oxford North, where E. W. Nesbitt, Liberal Unionist, who is opposed by Lieut.-Col. Sutherland, Unionist, has been endorsed by the prime minister; Toronto South, where D. A. Carey, Labor candidate, is in the field against Dr. Sheard, Unionist; Wellington North, York East, where there is no Liberal candidate; Chateaufort and Joliette, where there are two Liberals in the field.

Hamilton Undecided.

Up to this evening Sir Wilfrid was undecided as to the endorsement of candidates in a number of constituencies in some of which there are Labor and independent candidates running.

These include the Hamilton seats. Apparently the opposition leader is not endorsing candidates if he is in doubt as to their desire to have his approval of their candidature. The undecided seats are: Brant, Fort William and Rainy River, Hamilton West, Hamilton East, Kent, Lincoln, Toronto West, Welland, Yarmouth and Chateaufort, and Mackenzie, Sask.

Sir Wilfrid's endorsements include a number of candidates who are running as independent Liberals. They favor, in most cases, the endorsement of the Military Service Act, but otherwise hold themselves free to criticize the government. He has also endorsed a number of independent Labor and Socialist candidates.

Mrs. Rowell, at St. Thomas,
Speaks in Election Campaign

St. Thomas, Ont., Nov. 23.—The largest and most representative audience of women ever assembled in St. Thomas was present in the city hall today to hear Mrs. N. W. Rowell give an address in the interest of the Union government. Mrs. Rowell's address gave a clear explanation as to the formation of the Union government, which was launched entirely for the purpose of having Canada help to win the war.

The meeting was also addressed by Miss Margaret Coyne, B.A., of St. Thomas, and Dr. Anna Backus of Aylmer, Ont., both of whom are taking a prominent part in the election campaign for the Union government.

GUROFSKY DROPS OUT IN WEST TORONTO

Leaves Laurier Standard to Be Carried by C. W. Kerr.

Louis Gurofsky is not a candidate in West Toronto constituency and the Liberal field is now open to Charles W. Kerr, who will receive official recognition as the Liberal candidate immediately. A private meeting was held yesterday at which the situation in West Toronto was discussed. It was attended by several prominent Liberals, some of whom urged Mr. Gurofsky to remain.

After a somewhat lengthy session he reached his decision, and the following is a copy of the letter he sent to the returning officer of West Toronto riding: "Believing that in the interests of Canada the opposition to Union government should not be divided, I have decided not to contest the Liberal riding of West Toronto in the coming election, and would therefore ask you to not print my name on the ballots as I hereby withdraw my nomination."

LAURIER HESITATED TO HELP RECRUITING

Premier Borden at St. Mary's Tells of Sir Wilfrid's Supineness.

St. Mary's, Ont., Nov. 23.—At this afternoon's meeting in the opera house in support of the candidature of Dr. Robert Borden, the speaker, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, was dealt with the criticism by Sir Wilfrid Laurier of his statement at Sydney that the Liberal leader had twice declined when asked to assist in voluntary recruiting, and the reply of Sir Wilfrid to the effect that he had only been asked once that he could remember. I know of very little effort that Sir Wilfrid has made to aid recruiting in the last three years, especially in his own Province of Quebec," declared Sir Robert.

In the fall of 1916 he had declined to join the premier in recruiting. He had rejected the invitation of the Hamilton Canadian Club. In this connection he read a letter sent on Feb. 20 to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. N. W. Rowell, and himself by the secretary of that organization asking for a written endorsement of their recruiting efforts. While Mr. Rowell and the premier had been given an unqualified endorsement, Sir Wilfrid had replied: "I am sorry that I cannot send you at once an affirmative answer. I will look into the matter but will keep you posted." The Liberal leader had had it under advisement ever since.

"Isn't that an inspiring answer?" he asked the audience with which he proposes to supersede the Military Service Act? If so then God help the country, for the speaker, Sir Robert, declared that the premier had been asked to do so. The meeting was a large and enthusiastic one, presided over by Wm. Dalrymple, Esq., and all the patriotic societies in the town were in force. The premier was escorted from the train to the hall by the Maxwells.

NEW BUREAU CREATED IN OTTAWA MINISTRY

Dominion Immigration and Colonization Department to Have High-Salaried Minister.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Formal notice appears in The Canada Gazette of the creation of the department of immigration and colonization. The minister is to receive a salary of \$7000 per annum. The order-in-council also provided that "as the prime minister will no longer receive the salary attached to the office of president of the privy council, a salary should be provided for the secretary of state for external affairs (the position held by Sir Robert Borden), whose office by law belongs to the member of the King's privy council for Canada, who holds the recognized position of first minister." The salary of the secretary of state for external affairs is fixed at \$7000 per annum.

Were Called to Support McCoig, But Many Cheered for Plewes

Chatham, Nov. 23.—A tumultuous scene was enacted at a meeting of the labor men of the city last night, called supposedly for the purpose of forming a labor union, but of which the real intent appears to have been to further the interests of A. B. McCoig, Laurier candidate for this riding. That this meeting was promoted by his supporters was indicated by the indirect attacks which were made on the government by parties who, while professing to have the interests of the labor men at heart, have spoken on McCoig's platform during the present campaign. The meeting was thrown into turmoil by several real labor men who objected to the tactics of the party men, one of whom took the platform while Captain Madry of London, a labor man, was speaking, and refused to leave until he had disclosed the method of the meeting.

In the midst of the address by one of the main speakers a large portion of the audience got up and sang "God Save the King," and then gave three cheers for J. W. Plewes, Union government candidate.

Altho the majority of the men left at this stage, officers were elected, with Ross Huff president, A. McCullister vice-president, and M. Barclay secretary.

TO ORGANIZE E. C. LIBERALS

Kitchener, Ont., Nov. 23.—Efforts are being made here by Unionists to organize the women of the riding who have votes to support W. G. Weichel. It is expected that a meeting of women voters supporting Union government will be held at the recently opened Weichel headquarters the first part of the week. At the meeting members of the Union executive will discuss the details of the campaign, and the women have been approached in connection with inaugurating an active campaign, and they have expressed themselves most enthusiastically over the prospects of electioneering among the women of the riding.

The Weichel campaign is speeding up locally. New campaign headquarters were opened today and immediately the detail campaign work was begun. W. G. Weichel, before starting for Elmira tonight to address a Union meeting, declared that at every section of the riding prospects for a Union sweep were brightening. Mr. Weichel and his executive declare that they have every reason for optimism.

Oshawa Armory and Theatre Secured for Borden Meeting

SCOTT ACT SUSPENDED.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Operation of the Canada Temperance Act is to be suspended in the Counties of Northumberland, York and Carleton, N.B. The action is taken in deference to petitions received. The provincial law in New Brunswick, it is pointed out here, imposes as great restrictions on sale and traffic in liquor as does the federal act. Suspension continues as long as the provincial law contains such restrictions.
