FOR THIRD TIME Attempt to Block Chippawa Development Fails at Osgoode Hall. A NOVEL ATTEMPT

HYDRO WINS CASE

Company's Action to Restrain Province So Termed by Chief Justice.

The third attempt of the Electrical Development Co. of Ontario, Limited, to prevent the Hydro-Electric Power Commission from proceeding with the Chippawa power developm nt cheme came to the ground yesterday when Chief Justice Sir William Meredith in the appeliate division dismissed the company's second appeal from previous decisions. The chief justice termed the com

pany's action a novel attempt to ob-tain judgment against the province to restrain it from carrying into effect the provision of a statute. The writ claimed a declaration that

the Hydro-Electric Commission had no right to divert the water of the Niagara or Welland Rivers, notwith-Niagara or Weland Rivers, notwith-standing Ontario legislation, and that an agreement between the company and the Queen Victoria Park Commission-ers, under which the company as-serted that the company's hands are tied, was binding upon the lieutenant-governor-in-council.
