A citizen complaining that portions of the sidewalks on Rockland road are in bad condition and require attention. The party referred to also reports two holes in the sidewalk on Hill street.

Jimmy Walker, of City road, who had been missing for several days, returned home on Saturday. He had been in Woodstock with a horseman for the races, and spent several days there with relatives.

A report was current today that steamer Springfield would go on the Bellisle route, beginning tomorrow or Wednesday. Captain Porter said he did not care to make any definite statement until the boat was actually sailing.

Work on the new north end branch building of the Bank of N. B. is being rapidly pushed forward. The lower sections of two of the stone pillars have been placed in position, and the superstructure is now well under way.

SENT UP FOR THEFT Edward LePage Committed to County Court for Theft of a Cash Box and Money.

The case against Edward LePage, who is charged with stealing \$22 from Leopold Lamonte, was taken up this morning, and the prisoner pleaded not guilty. The complainant said that he was boarding at the Bazaar Royal Hotel, and had his money at the cigar factory on King Square. He knew the defendant for some time. On the night of the theft, he had a conversation with LePage relative to the theft. He told him that he had money stolen and the prisoner said that he did not believe it. The witness said that he did not see the box again until Friday last, when the detective had it.

To the detective the witness said that LePage said to him when he went to Beat & McCarthy's shop on Friday, after seeing the box, "Give me a chance and I will pay back the money." LePage asked the witness if the box was not taken by a man named Moore, and Lamonte replied in the negative. The witness said LePage took the box. Lamonte said he had his suspicions about Moore first.

Albert Brou said that LePage came into his place of business, 21 North street, about the second week in June and asked him if he had an ash barrel to throw something away. He said yes, and the prisoner threw the parcel in it. He became suspicious, the witness opened the parcel and found the box. He kept it and Detective Killen demanded it on Friday last. The cash box and a piece of a pair of scissors in it. Killen said that the scissors were a material piece of evidence. Brou said he knew nothing against the prisoner until this case.

The case was then adjourned until tomorrow at ten o'clock, when Detective Killen will have Moore present. Both witnesses entered into recognizances to appear before the county court the 4th Tuesday August.

MONCTON'S WIRE WALKER MONCTON, July 21.—Prof. Dugay, a Kent county boy, who is known as the "King of High Wire Walkers" in American and European cities, where he has thrilled large crowds with his sensational high wire feats, is at present travelling through the provinces trying to regain his health, which has become impaired, and has been spending some time in Moncton with his brother, Wm. Dugay, of the I. C. R. Prof. Dugay is well remembered in Moncton and vicinity by many people as having given, under the auspices of different organizations, some years ago, what were probably the greatest exhibitions of high wire walking ever seen in the province. He was then at the height of his career, but shortly after, owing to having caught a bad cold, he went to Europe in the hope of regaining his health, and at the same time giving performances in the leading cities of the old country.

WALTER BARKER ON THE ROLLERS Walter Barker, son of George Barker, the city, now with the Walker Shoe Company of New York, is making a name for himself as a roller skater. The New York American, dated July 19th, says: "Walter Barker, the fast Twentieth Century skater, is rapidly approaching championship form." Last night at Madison Square Garden rink, Barker was on the eighty yard mark in the mile and a half handicap and finished an easy winner. Harry McDonald, the Mercury Foot champion, dropped out of the race at the mile post, not being able to follow the fast pace set by Barker. J. J. Jordan, the scotch man, fell on the fourteenth lap and did not finish. Barker's time was 4.46 3-5."

DROWNING ACCIDENT

Thomas Stultz Drowned Near Amherst Yesterday Afternoon.

AMHERST, N. S., July 23 (Special).—An unfortunate drowning accident occurred yesterday afternoon at Blar's Lake, about a mile from Amherst, whereby Thomas Stultz, the sixteen year old son of John Stultz, of Sackville, N. B., lost his life. The deceased was with others and went in swimming. He had gone out to a raft and returned and was going out for the second time when his either took a cramp or became exhausted and immediately sank.

The searching parties worked until two o'clock this morning before his body was recovered. An inquest is being held at the undertaking parlors of Christie Bros. & Co. The young man was of excellent character and was engaged in cutting stone with his father at Barker's new building, Victoria street. A young lady by the name of Viola Mathison was seriously bitten yesterday by a vicious dog.
