The Fire in New York.—We give such further particulars with regard to this great fire as we find in the New York papers of yesterday; among them a corrected list of the sufferers. Crocker & Warren, in whose store the explosion took place, have published a card declaring that there was no gunpowder there. Much discussion has however arisen on the question, whether saltpetre alone could produce such an explosion, and the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, in a communication to the City Government, asking for an investigation of the cause of this calanity, says: "The strongest suspicion exists that gunpowder was stored in the building that exploded."

Most of the Insurance Companies in New York will survive the shock, although the capital of many of them will be trenched upon scriously to pay losses. The American Mutual, the Merchants' Fire, the Guardian and the Manhattan Offices have resolved to wind up their business, and cancel existing policies us far as possible. They expect to pay nearly or quite all their losses.

More Victims of the Explosion.—Henry Medigos and Henry Rodman, both Germans, entered a store adjoining that in which the explosion occurred, a few minutes previous to the catastrophe, and have not since been seen.

Peter Mayher, public porter, and his wife, when the explosion occurred had not escaped from their residence in Broad street, which was overthrown by the explosion, and they are supposed to have been killed.

The chief of Police, Mr. Matsell, and a hundred of the police force, are this morning at work searching for the bodies of those supposed to have perished. The applications to the Chief of Police for permission to visit the ruins in order to look for missing relatives and friends have been very nunerous, and there is too much reason to fear that a large number have fallen victims to this droadful conflagration.

The body of Mr. Cowdry, of Engine No. 42, buried under the ruins in New Street, is not yet discovered. The bodies of two other persons were brought from the ruins of No. 42 Broad street, the Coroner's office. One of them is a white man, named Peter A. Johnston, and has left a widow and 3 children. The other was a colored man.—We have also learned that a woman was burnt to death at No. 13 Broad street.

The buildings Nos. 48, 49, 50 and 51, in Exclange Place, roported as destroyed are all atsmding.
