**LOCAL NEWS**

**COBURG STREET CHURCH**  
At the close of a very interesting and inspiring service held in Coburg street Christian Church last evening, a husband and wife responded to the Gospel invitation. The gentleman was received into the church fellowship, and the lady made the good confession.

**OFF TO VALCARTIER.**  
Sergeant Major Irving D. Appleby, of the 28th Battalion, will leave today for Valcartier. He returned on last Wednesday after taking part in the famous Kiltie campaign in Boston, New York and Chicago. Sergeant Major Appleby went to Boston on June 10, and remained there after the band returned. He aided materially in the vigorous recruiting campaign and was highly commended by the Boston papers.

**MILITARY HOSPITALS.**  
While there still are some details to be arranged regarding the plans for erecting a wing at the county hospital to care for returned soldiers in the advanced stages of tuberculosis, the negotiations for the establishment of a hospital at River Glade Sanitarium, are complete. The plans have been prepared and approved and the hospital commission is now ready to arrange contracts for remodeling and equipping the building.

**COAL PRICES**  
The agitation over the cost of coal has been confined chiefly to a discussion of anthracite prices, but there are some figures which might indicate the need of inquiry into the selling prices of soft coal, which is produced much nearer home. In a recent statement by the U. S. Secretary of the navy, he said that the navy contract for steam coal is for \$2.88 a ton, and that the proposal to fix the price according to cost of production plus a reasonable profit to the mine owners, probably would reduce this figure.

**PENOBSCUIS WINS, 11 TO 8**  
Again the Beavers beat the Redwings on Saturday afternoon, but this time the game was so closely contested that it was doubtful as to which team would win. It ended in favor of Penobscuis with a score of 11 to 8. Robinson pitched a good game for the Beavers, having eighteen strike outs to his credit, while Penobscuis used two pitchers, having twelve strike outs to their credit. The game started at three o'clock and went nine innings with little disputing and was considered a good game.

**FERRY BUSINESS CARRIED ON AT LOSS**  
Indiantown Cross-river Transport Matter Discussed Today by Commission

In order to discuss the situation arising from the fact that the Lancaster ferry is being operated at a heavy loss, a meeting of the Lancaster Ferry Commission was held this morning in the office of J. Y. Russell, commissioner of harbors and ferries, who, by virtue of his office, is a member of the commission. Present were Commissioner Joseph O'Brien, Heber Vroom and the county secretary, J. King Kelley.

**THIRD NEPHEW OF REV. W. D. WILSON IS KILLED IN WAR**

Rev. W. D. Wilson, prohibition inspector, has received official notification that his third nephew has been killed in action, having made the supreme sacrifice on July 21.

When Rev. Mr. Wilson came to this country from Scotland his brother and family accompanied him and took up their residence in Cape Breton. This family consisted of two sons and one daughter. When war broke out the eldest three boys offered their services and left with Nova Scotia battalions for the firing line. The oldest two boys were killed at the battle of the Mons, and now comes the word that Frank Wilson, who was not eighteen years old, had been killed in action.

The father of these brave boys died soon after his first two boys were killed. The only remaining brother is too young to fight or he would be in France. One sister also survives.

**FIRST LORNEVILLE MAN TO DIE IN WAR**

Gunner David Anderson Evans Was Killed in Action on July 16

Gunner David Anderson Evans of Lorneville, who was killed in action on July 16, went overseas with the 35th Infantry Battalion, but later was transferred to an artillery unit with which he was serving at the time of his death. Lorneville has furnished many stalwart

fighting men in proportion to the number of residents, but this is the first of them to be wounded fatally, and the name of Gunner Evans will be enshrined in the memory of the people of his community as the first of their number to give his life in the great war.

He was twenty-nine years of age and was unmarried. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Evans, of Lorneville, and three brothers, Albert of West St. John, Sergeant W. J. W., at the front; Thomas of Prince Rupert, B. C.; Robert of Lorneville and Richard, Wash. and Harvey at home; there is also one sister, Miss Mary, of Boston. A service in memory of the gallant soldier will be held in Lorneville on August 12.

**NINE ON BENCH IN POLICE COURT**

Something Like Times Before Prohibition

All Charged With Drunkenness and Several With Having Liquor Illegally in Their Possession—Two Fines of \$200

It looked like the days previous to May 1 in the police court when Magistrate Ritchie took his seat this morning. There were ten prisoners and nine of these were charged with drunkenness and three faced the additional charge of having liquor in their possession.

The magistrate dealt severely with some of the offenders and signified his intention of punishing all delinquents in respect to the prohibition act.

Edward Holt pleaded guilty to drunkenness and also to having liquor in his possession. The magistrate fined him \$8 for drunkenness and \$200 or three months in jail for the latter charge.

George Fitzpatrick was fined a similar amount, \$208 for two like offences.

Two other prisoners pleaded guilty to simple drunkenness and were each fined \$8 for two months in jail.

Earnest Howe and Frank Kingston, arrested together after midnight pleaded guilty to drunkenness but not guilty to having liquor in their possession. The police said that a bottle was found on Howe. The bottle was produced in court. Looking at the bottle Howe said: "Your Honor, that bottle was more than half full when it was taken from me." The bottle contained less than half as it stood on the magistrate's desk. The magistrate ordered Howe to be sent below. The other man was fined \$8 for drunkenness.

Three men arrested at 3.45 o'clock this morning pleaded guilty to drunkenness at Beatty's Beach, West St. John. The nine prisoners were ordered below and the policemen making the respective arrests were sent with them to attempt to find out where the men got the liquor.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, and Sub-Inspector Crawford were present during the court proceedings and also went down stairs with the offenders.

A large number attended a meeting of the St. John District Lodge, I. O. G. T., which was held at Fairfield, St. John county, on Saturday evening.
