**HAVE TAKEN 167,780 PRISONERS**

Since April 9, when the 1917 campaign opened, the allies have taken 167,780 prisoners. The British led with 46,155 prisoners taken.

The French have taken the famous Hill 804, the last remaining stronghold of the Germans fronting Verdun.

After the capture of Hill 804, the French made a further advance of 2,000 yards, thus greatly strengthening their position.
