The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Geo. Dean, Chairman of Calgary District, assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Stevenson, of Medicine Hat, and D. G. McQueen (Presbyterian), Stunden (Anglican), Mellick and McDonald (Baptist), and C. E. Somerset (Methodist). Mr. McQueen preached a short sermon from 16th chapter of the Gospel by St. John, 33rd verse. One of the most touching scenes was the procession of bright little boys and girls—members of the Children's Guild, a society formed by the deceased only a few months before—following the remains of the one whom they had learned to love to its last resting-place. On the following Sabbath evening, the Rev. Mr. Dean, of Calgary, preached a memorial sermon from the text, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are called according to his purpose." Bro. Hanna leaves behind to mourn his loss a wife and one beautiful little girl.
