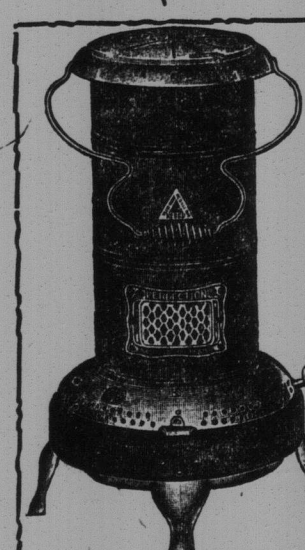

Capt. Willans Wounded

Local Officers Leave For England; Acadian Battalion, the 165th, to Winter in St. John

An officer of the 26th Battalion in a recent letter tells of the review of the 26th by King George, they having been chosen as a representative Canadian battalion. Of course, despite orders against giving receptions and instructions to carry on in the usual way, there was a brief stop, while the boys cheered. His Majesty saw some of them practicing the handling of machine guns and others in their usual drill. The battalion got its hardest test when it took over a piece of newly recaptured line on an evening of June 14 and endured practically a constant heavy bombardment for five days and as many nights.

Now in Hospital

Captain Willans Wounded
A recent cable from London is to the effect that among the Canadian officers who were recently sent to England after having been wounded is Captain R. H. Willans. He left St. John as a major with the 60th Battalion and, after arriving in England, dropped his major's rank and crossed to France as a trench inspector.

The midnight casualty list contained the name of Horace Lunnin of Tracey Station, wounded.
