The final meeting of the Associated Charities for this season was held yesterday afternoon in the Bible Society's rooms with W. Shives Fisher, president, in the chair. Arrangements were made for carrying on the work during the summer months and Miss Grace O. Robertson, secretary, was granted her usual leave of absence.

Some special cases were discussed and steps taken to procure relief for those in need. The statistical statement given by Miss Robertson of her work during the month of April was as follows:

Applications received, 145; seeking employment, 17; employment was found for, 14; records given, 28; seeking relief, 45; relief was procured for, 61; visits made, 103; clothing was given to, 11; cases investigated, 14; and seeking transportation, 3.

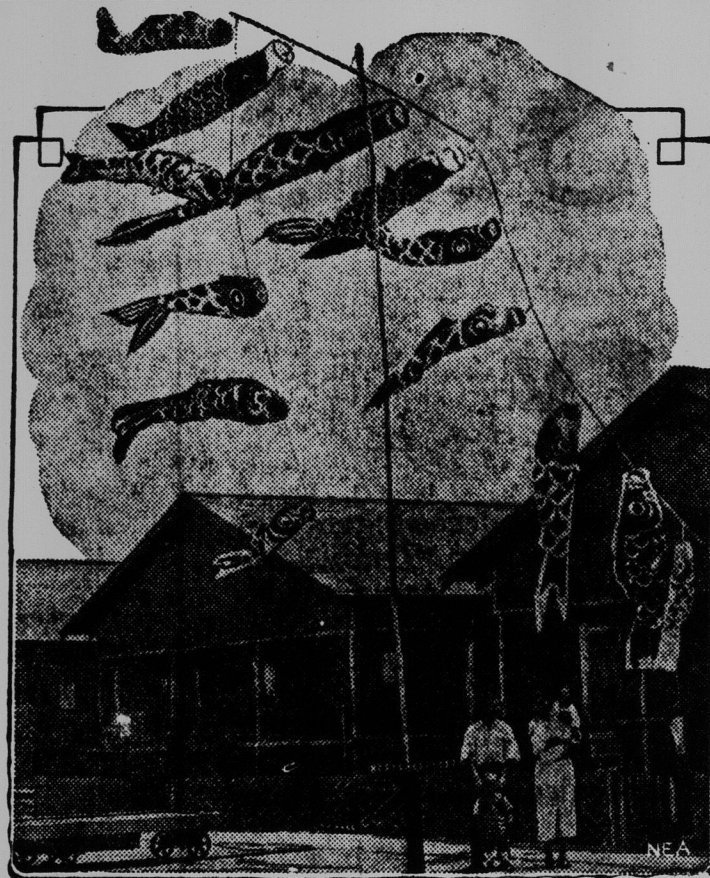

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M'GILL DOCTORS HEARD IN THE CITY

Addresses Delivered Before Saint John Medical Society; Subjects Talked

Several interesting addresses on matters of professional interest were delivered before the Saint John Medical Society last evening at a meeting in the Admiral Beatty Hotel. The addresses were a part of the extra mural course being given by the Canadian Medical Association. Monthly meetings of a similar character will be held during the summer. Dr. V. D. Davidson presided. More than 40 members were present, including several from out of town. The attendance was the largest since the course was started.

The speakers were: Dr. L. J. Ren, of Montreal, assistant professor of pathology at McGill, who spoke on lesions of the heart in acute rheumatic fever and their sequelae; Dr. D. Grant Campbell, of Montreal, assistant professor of medicine at McGill, who took as his subject the prevention and treatment of scarlet fever; and Dr. L. H. McKim, of Montreal, assistant professor of surgery at McGill, who spoke on injuries and infections of the hand.

There was considerable discussion of the addresses in which Dr. G. A. B. Addy, Dr. H. L. Abramson, Dr. C. M. Kelly, S. H. McDonald and Dr. J. H. Allingham took part.
