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## DOCTOR DETERMINES VICTOR OF BOUT DAY AFTER MATCH

A remarkable incident, unprecedented in British boxing, took place recently when the result of the bout between Danny Frush and Billy Matthews was withheld until the day after the contest. In the fifth round Frush, who had had the better of the bout, was brought down by a low punch, which the referee did not see. Frush claimed a foul, which was confirmed by the ring doctor. Matthews, however, claimed an outside doctor to decide. The following day the medical man selected by Matthews decided that Frush had been hit low, whereupon the referee disqualified Matthews and gave the verdict to Frush.

The defendant was represented by J. D. P. Lewin, K. C., while Dr. Fred B. Taylor, K. C., appeared for the prosecution.

C. Stoner, a young twirler who was uncovered by Giant scouts in the wilds of Knoxville, Tenn.

## CROWD ASSAULTS ENGLISH REFEREE

Boxing Fans Attack Miller After Bout Decision.

W. Miller, a popular English boxing referee, has been the victim of an aggravated assault at the hands of a number of boxing fans who disagreed with his decision in a bout at the Weston Baths, London, between Johnny Sullivan, a protégé of Carpenter, and Bob Jackson. The general view was that Sullivan had been outpointed, but the referee awarded him the decision. Immediately this was announced an attack was made upon the referee, who was struck to the floor. Tom Broadbent, another popular referee, went to his colleague's assistance and was himself hit on the head with some weapon. A well-known heavy-weight went to the rescue of his manager, but force of numbers compelled him to fight a retreating battle. The police soon quelled the outbreak and the programme was resumed.
