crosses in deposits abroad of \$25,000,000,
which may be accounted for by the pro-
ceeds of the recent \$100,000,000 loan not
being at that time transferred to Canada.
Partly for the same reason bank balances
abroad showed an increase of \$64,000,
000. Current loans in Canada were down
by \$23,000,000, and note circulation by
\$10,000,000, changes which indicate a
certain amount of liquidation. The in-
crease of \$10,000,000 in other assets is
exceptional.

MARINE NOTES.

The schooner Cynthia J. Griffen sailed
this morning for New York with a full
cargo of lumber.
The steamer Wagland sailed for Bos-
ton in ballast early this morning, after
discharging a cargo of raw sugar at the
refinery.

The steamer Mary docked at the re-
finery this morning to discharge her
cargo of raw sugar from San Domingo.
Among the arrivals at Quebec yester-
day were the Minnedosa, Liverpool; Cas-
andra, Glasgow; Empress of India, Liver-
pool; Cabrinavon, Newcastle and
Leith, and Manchester Producer, Man-
chester.

The steamer Scythia arrived at
Quebec from New York on Saturday.
The steamer Canadian Runner has
sailed from Campbellton for Glasgow
with lumber and general cargo.

The steamer Philip T. Dodge cleared
from Chatham on June 29 for Portland,
Me., with 2,800 cords of roused pulp
wood.

The steamer Megantic sailed from Liv-
erpool for Montreal on Sunday.
The steamer Corsican arrived at Glas-
gow from Montreal yesterday.

The steamer Empress of Britain ar-
rived at Liverpool from Montreal on
Saturday.

The steamer Canadian Ranger arrived
at Liverpool from Montreal yesterday.

The steamer Canadian Mariner ar-
rived at Montreal from London yester-
day.

The steamer Antonia sailed from
Montreal for Plymouth yesterday.

H. M. S. Raleigh and Constance ar-
rived at Montreal from Halifax yester-
day.

The steamer Rosalind arrived at Hal-
ifax from New York yesterday.

The schooner Mary G. Duff and
Daniel Groom sailed from Halifax for
New York yesterday.

The White Star Dominion liner Regina
arrived at Quebec from Liverpool yester-
day with 180 cabin and 224 third class
passengers.

Steamship agents at Halifax have
reached an agreement with the Long-
shoremen's Association by which the
present wages will be continued until
November 30. The present rates are
fifty-five cents an hour by day and sixty-
five by night.

The R. M. S. P. Caracquet, arrived
from Bermuda yesterday afternoon with
fifty-three first, ten second and seven
third-class passengers. She also carried
a large cargo of sugar and molasses and
some mail. Among the passengers were
Colonel Hooley and wife, who is in
charge of the company's business in the
West Indies, and seven sisters from a
Bermuda convent. There was one Chinese
passenger.

CUSTOMS FIGURES.

Details of the customs returns at this
port in June, the total of which was
given out yesterday, are: Import duty,
\$647,824.54; sundries, \$1,299.25; excise
tax, \$59,794.44; excise duty, \$4,262.08;
pilgrimage dues, \$3,159.50; steamship in-
spection, \$610; marine dues, \$611.56;
total, \$717,700.32. The figures for June,
1921, were: Import duty, \$408,967.10;
sundries, \$1,098.81; excise tax, \$50,838.50;
excise duty, \$18,847.18; pilgrimage dues,
\$1,538.25; steamship inspection, \$500;
marine dues, \$232.29; total, \$479,384.22, a
gain of \$238,365.40 for June of this year.

EXPORT AND IMPORT PRICES.

(Bank of Commerce Circular.)

Our combined number for the whole-
sale prices of exports and imports has
risen from 181.18 in mid-May to 183.13
in mid-June, our export and import
numbers, respectively, moving in oppo-
site directions. Export prices have fallen
from 157.63 to 162.34, or approximately
to the April figures; import prices have
risen from 144.74 to 184.02, or nearly as
high as the figures of thirteen months
ago. A certain amount of this appar-
ently violent fluctuation is due to sea-
sonal changes, downwards in the case of
dairy products among the exports, and
upwards in that of sugar and tea among
the imports. As far as our exports are
concerned, the change is due in part to
price adjustment between grains and an-
imal products; wheat, flour and oatmeal
have fallen, while cattle, beef, hogs and
bacon have risen. Wool, hides and cop-
per also show higher prices, but the fall
in cereals has more than offset these,
and the result is that the export number
has fallen. Among our imports, on the
other hand, rubber is the only item
which shows a recession in price; the re-
