COMMENT ON IRON, STEEL, METAL AND MACHINERY

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ending May 19th, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

The matter of turning from the period of liquidation to straight business is occupying the attention of dealers in the iron, steel, and to some extent in the tool market. For some months past, the market has been engaged in reducing their stocks and for this purpose they have, in many cases, given special prices to those who are not ready to buy in the new market, and their policy has been to place in excess of the liquidation figure. But they are not ready to state with any degree of definiteness what will materialize in the next few days.

During the week that has passed dealers in several lines reported better business than have had for some time. They do not regard this as evidence of a turn in the market, but as a result of the fact that they have come down perhaps a little during the week, but the movement in that direction is very gradual, and most of the lines have already been reduced. Bar mill material is quoted around \$75 per pound and cold rolled sheeting at \$60 per pound.

the latter being for bridge work. The scrap metal market continues to be poor. The volume of business done is very small. One of the large dealers claims that his firm has not a single contract at the present time, nor is it anxious to make one, because it is going to be unable to buy at the low figures. Nearly all the business is being done in very small lots. One yard reports that a three-ton truck went out on a recent trip and took with it 40 orders, whereas in normal times orders would fill the truck. Some of the yards are finding it necessary to make a special charge for delivery under a certain weight or value.

GROCERY MARKET

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs in Canadian Grocer this week: The markets for general grocery commodities are ruling fairly steady although there appears to be considerable price cutting by wholesale houses. Sugar refineries are holding their list price but there is a great deal of irregularity in prices, many houses cutting prices to practically below their cost, undoubtedly in many instances this is being done in order to clear up prices have advanced 8-4 cent per pound in an unsettled condition although during the past week the undertone was somewhat strengthened.

Tea, coffee, walnuts and almonds continue in a strong position under an active demand. Advice from the coast states that there is likely to be higher prices on the new pack of soyabean oil inasmuch as the attitude of the fishermen who have recently refused to fish at the price set. These fishermen have been engaged principally in fish sockeye, and if the higher prices are allowed to the fishermen naturally this can be expected to reflect on the finished product.

The situation in the primary markets for prunes and apples has been considerably strengthened owing to the increased demand for export to Europe. This has resulted in holders of May 19th, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

EMPLOYMENT IS IMPROVING

Ottawa Reports Increase of Half of One Per Cent in Week-Slight in Maritime Provinces.

The Employment Service of Canada, Department of Labor, Ottawa, has announced that employment reports for the week ended April 23, were received by Dominion headquarters of the Employment Service of Canada from 5303 firms employing 896,156 workers. For the previous week these identical firms had reported total pay-rolls of \$86,124, a difference representing an increase of one half of one per cent. The favorable indications of the previous two weeks have, therefore, been continued on a moderate but slightly increasing scale. Comparing the figures for the week under review with the base week of January 17, 1920, the index number of em-

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
