Arrests in Dynamite Conspiracy Cases are Being Made

NUMBER 50 OR MORE

Structural Iron Workers' President and Business Agents and Carpenters' Business Agent Among Those Put Under Arrest Early in the Day

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 14—Arrests in the dynamite conspiracy cases began today and soon many of the fifty or more defendants were arrested in various parts of the country.

Among the first arrested was Frank M. Ryan, president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers. He was taken in Indianapolis, where the international headquarters are located, and where J. J. McNamara, the convicted dynamite maker, was arrested last April. Reports from many cities show government's intention to arrest all known as one time.

Eleven business agents of the iron workers, four or five officials and some members of the executive board who are charged with knowing what McNamara did with money used to buy explosives, were taken into custody.
