TALK OF NEW SCHOOL IN DOUGLAS AVENUE**Matter of Penny Banks and Other Business Before Trustees**

Due to the fact that the school law will prevent the operation of the penny savings system in the schools during school hours the trustees, at their monthly meeting last night, decided to postpone the introduction of the system until after the summer holidays. The need of a new school building in Douglas Avenue to replace the present one was brought to the attention of the board and a committee was appointed to report on the project. Authority will be asked to issue \$40,000 bonds for permanent work. The matter of a pupil, who lives in the Isolation Hospital, attending the Sand Point School, was left to Superintendent Hildes to get a physician's advice.

Applications for positions on the teaching staff were received from J. Roy Bell, Herbert L. Logan, Miss Beatrice Marchess, Miss Frances Trainor and Miss S. A. Mullin. The applications were referred to the teachers' committee.

It was decided to confer with Dr. Carter, chief superintendent of education, in regard to manual training and domestic science schools.

The committee which has charge of the fitting up of a new department for manual training reported that the new room was about ready.

Dr. Bridge, was given authority to ask the advice of a physician and act in regard to the attendance at the Sand Point school of a pupil who lives at the Isolation Hospital. It seems that the child has been kept out of the school on account of living in the hospital where there are two smallpox cases. The trustees expressed the opinion that no chances should be taken in case of this kind.

The report of the trustee officer showed that there had been 72 irregular attendances and 15 truants reported during the month. The secretary reported that 7,175 pupils

were enrolled; the average daily attendance, 6,180; two pupils died during the month and there were four cases of scarlet fever, one diphtheria and one suspected smallpox case.

AMENDMENTS TO THE LIQUOR ACT

Also a Bill for Ready-Made Farms for Settlers Introduced in Legislature

Fredrickson, April 15—Bills providing for important amendments to the Liquor License Act and to provide for the establishment of a new government department to prepare ready made farms for settlers were presented to the legislature at Fredericton this afternoon.

Under the first provision is made for the inspection of liquor under the pure food law; creditors are given no redress at law for liquor debts; the fine for drunkenness in St. John is fixed at \$2; provision is made for the enforcement of the act in parishes where prohibition has been introduced on order of the government-in-council and a penalty is provided for automobiles carrying liquor into districts where its sale is prohibited.

The bill to encourage the settlement of farm lands provides for the appointment of a board of three commissioners and the borrowing of \$100,000 for their operations. The board will be given power to purchase lands, buildings and equipment, prepare farms for occupancy and to sell them to settlers, either native or immigrant, at cost price on long term payments.

The premier announced that Hon. Mr. Rogers, minister of the interior was to be provided \$4,000 for the salary and expenses of a superintendent for this work, to have a special pamphlet prepared for circulation in Great Britain and to direct immigration to this province. Norton Griffiths had said that, if ten or

twenty farms are ready for occupancy by June he can provide settlers for them. The house agreed to bills to incorporate the St. Croix Dock & Railway Co., and to confirm an agreement by the city of St. John, the C. P. R. and the king.

Hon. Mr. Melzod introduced a bill relating to the election of mayor and aldermen in Fredericton.

Mr. LaBelle gave notice of motion for an address for correspondence relating to the settlement of crown lands in the parish of Eldon, Restigouche county.

Mr. Flemming announced that an arrangement had been made for delivering coal from the Grand Lake district over the Transcontinental via Moncton.

At the evening session Premier Fleming spoke at length on the budget and was followed by Mr. LaBelle who replied effectively to the premier and dealt with statements made by Dr. Landry. He pointed out the extravagance and incompetence of the present administration in dealing with roads and public works.

Mr. Bentley followed and read a carefully prepared statement concerning the matter in which he had been misrepresented by Premier Fleming on Friday evening.

CONTROVERSY OVER SYSTEM OF LABOR

Difference of Opinion at Meeting of Steel Corporation Stockholders is Adjusted

New York, April 16—A controversy between Chairman E. H. Gary of the United States Steel Corporation, and Charles M. Cabot, of Boston, at the annual stockholders' meeting of the corporation here yesterday over a resolution providing for a three shift system of labor at the mills instead of the present twelve hour shifts and for a new investigation of labor conditions, ended with the withdrawal of the resolution by Mr. Cabot.

The resolution was introduced after Judge Gary had read a report of the committee of stockholders that has investigated the labor conditions at the mills giving the corporation a clean bill of health. The report states that more than fifty-four per cent. of the stockholders to whom a circular by Cabot describing labor conditions at the mills had been sent, had given their approval of the management and that only thirteen per cent., chiefly women and clergymen, had expressed disapproval. The stockholders re-elected all the directors of the corporation retiring this year.
