RECENT DEATHS

Digby, Oct. 9—Albert J. S. Copp, ex-M.P., died at his home in Digby yesterday after a lingering illness, aged fifty-four years. He is survived by a widow and two daughters, Ethel and Kate, all of whom are at home. He also leaves one brother, T. J. Copp, of Amherst, and one sister, Mrs. T. E. Shipley, of River Hebert, Cumberland county.

Mr. Copp was a son of late Thomas Copp, of Digby, and was educated at Amherst Academy and also at Dorchester and Sackville (N. B.). He was called to the Nova Scotia bar in 1879. In 1880 he moved to Digby, where for years he carried on a successful practice and was appointed crown prosecutor for Digby county in 1887. In 1888 he married Eliza, youngest daughter of the late Jas. A. Dennison, of this town. He was a successful lawyer up to the time he entered politics, when he discontinued his practice.

Mr. Copp was a namesake of Sir Albert James Smith, minister of marine and fisheries during Alex. Mackenzie's administration. He was always an enthusiastic Liberal in politics. In 1896 he was elected representative for Digby county at Ottawa. He was again elected in 1900 and 1904. In 1908 he was defeated by Charles Jameson, Digby's present M.P. The funeral will take place at his late residence tomorrow afternoon at 2:30, interment in the Episcopal cemetery.

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
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BIGGEST FLEET IS ASSEMBLING AT NEW YORK, TO BE REVIEWED BY THE PRESIDENT AND NAVAL SECRETARY



New York, Oct. 10.—Many warships have already arrived, and others will come each day this week, to be on hand for the review, Oct. 14 and 15, when Secretary of the Navy Meyer and President Taft will review the fighting craft.

THE LONDON STAGE AND THE PEOPLE

Maxine Elliott Refuses To Play 'Inferior Sex' In England

Shaw, Pinero and Barry The Playwrights—Fanny Ward To Try Luck Again in London—Marie Tempest's Son Now a Manager

NEWS OF COMING TRIPLE BILL

London, Sept. 29.—As foreshadowed in my last letter the public has shown no burning desire to witness H. V. Esmond's new comedy, "A Young Man's Fancy," produced last season, a fortnight ago by the Grand Theatre, London. In the emergency, Leyel has been casting about to secure some new attraction, but up to coming to any definite arrangement regarding the future. He holds the English rights in "The Inferior Sex," the piece which Maxine Elliott did some time ago at her own theatre in New York, and he would like to see it put on in London for the part.

For the part, he offered it to Irene Vanbrugh, who, however, has a scheme for her own which she hopes to carry out in London. Leyel's last move was to open negotiations with Louis Meyer, of "The Glad Eye" fame, to come to London to produce "The Son and the Seducer" and my suspicion is that Gladys Unger's play, "The Son and the Seducer," which I have already mentioned, will be the attraction.

Mr. Meyer lately acquired from Madame Eadie, whether or not anything will come of the proposal remains to be seen. The other day I looked in at the Duke of York's to see if it would be possible to put on a special triple one-act play with Pinero, Barry and Shaw concerning anything other than the promised triple bill.

Pinero at once expressed his willingness provided the other two agreed to produce the play. I know I should have no difficulty in inducing Pinero to always good for a column or thereabouts in this respect were speedily confirmed.

In the whole course of his life, he declared, he had never publicly discussed a play of his and with every possible regard to the public interest, he has never mentioned the name of Pinero, he, too, retired into his shell, saying that must be all or none. The result is that playgoers will have to wait the first performance before learning anything authoritative about the promised triple bill.

They Used Same Effect. One interesting little detail I succeeded in unearthing, however. When Pinero's and Barry's plays were put into rehearsal it was found that the two had one very important feature in common. Each copy was of an absolutely identical character. Certainly it is the oddest thing in the world that the two writers working quite independently and for the same manager should have used similar means for the purpose of bringing about the crisis of the play. The editor of this paper has been told that the two writers had once offered to withdraw his piece and to substitute for it another which, by good luck, he had in his desk.

The proposal was accepted and I dare say the loss to the public will be of the slightest. The chief sufferers are, of course, the members of the company originally engaged, whose services will not now be required. Appropos, Pinero has laid the origin of his little drama in the reign of William III.

The short interest has increased in the last two days. Politics is growing warm, there is such a diversion of opinion in the prominent banking houses as to political effect that it more and more emphasizes the trading position.
