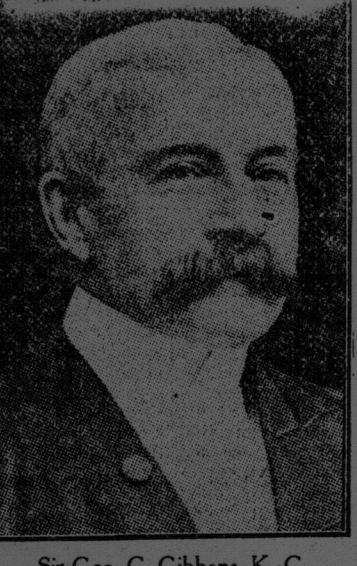
OUR NEW KNIGHTS

Sketches of Canadians Who Figured in New Year's Honors

Messrs. Aylesworth, Mackenzie, Mann, Gibbons, Tait and Chief Justice Townshend—Some Things They Have Done

The Toronto World speaking of New Year's honours conferred on Canadians, says:—

In recent years to decoration to any colonial statesman has been more deservingly bestowed than that of K. C. M. G., to Allen (now Sir Allen) Bristol Aylesworth.

worth, minister of justice and attorney-general of Canada. The honor follows closely upon Sir Allen's triumph at The Hague last summer, but it comes none too soon. It was Canada's victory, and Canada owes that victory to the untiring zeal, sagacity and legal erudition of the minister of justice. His foresight and tactics were masterful.

Sir Allen is a native of Ontario. Born at Newburgh on Nov. 27, 1854, he was educated at Newburgh high school and later became Prince's prizeman at Toronto University. He graduated with M. A. in 1875, and was called to the bar three years later. He became associated with the old firm of Messrs. Aylesworth and Arnou, which is said to have given more judges to Ontario than any other firm in the profession.

Sir Charles Townshend In a few years he became one of the leaders of the common law bar, and soon held more briefs than his older associates. The Ontario government created him a Q. C. in 1889, and later he received a similar distinction from the Earl of Dufferin, governor-general. He is a member of the Law Society of Upper Canada. He acted as junior counsel for Canada before the international tribunal in the Alaskan boundary dispute, subsequent to which he entered Sir Wilfrid Laurier's government as solicitor-general, and, on Sir Charles's elevation to the bench, was given the portfolio of minister of justice. His greatest work for Canada is found in his presentation of the case in the fisheries dispute before The Hague court.

Sir Charles J. Townshend Sir Charles J. Townshend, chief justice of Nova Scotia, is a son of the late Rev. Canon Townshend of Amherst, N. S. He was born March 22, 1844; educated at King's College, Windsor called to the bar in 1869, created a Q. C. in 1881, and appointed judge of the supreme court of Nova Scotia in 1887. He sat as a Conserver in the Nova Scotia Middlesex case, and was a member of the local government from 1878 to 1884, when he entered the house of commons, of which he was still a member at the time of his elevation to the bench. From 1878 to 1882 he was a member of the local government.

Sir William Mackenzie Sir William Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern, was born on Oct. 29, 1849, at Kirkfield, in Victoria county. He was educated at the public schools of the district and qualified as a teacher. When a young man he attended the military school in Toronto and is now Hon. Lieut. Col. of the 45th Victoria Regiment.

Mr. Mackenzie went into the lumber business, and when the Grand Trunk was building in Toronto, Nipissing and Victoria divisions, he undertook a portion of the construction. He was active in the construction of the C. P. R. through the mountains in British Columbia, where he is said to have laid the foundation of his present fortune.

He then turned his attention to the Canadian Northern, securing his first piece of railway from the Manitoba government for a small consideration, and having taken this step by his indomitable energy has woven the Canadian Northern across the continent. He is well known as president of the Toronto Railway Company and many other public service corporations.

Sir Donald Mann Sir Donald Mann is a native of Ayr, Ont., having been born in 1853. He is of Scottish descent. When 25 years of age, he went to Manitoba where he began his

The liabilities of the company are in the vicinity of \$600,000. An order for the payment of the claims of the company was issued by Judge Barry.

TO STOCK MAINE BROOKS WITH TROUT

Other Fry to be Placed in Ponds—Bass for the Kennebec

Augusta, Me., Jan. 7.—Last year the fish and game department planted 200,000 trout eggs, 1,035,000 salmon, 100,000 togo and 20,000 brown trout.

More eggs than ever before by several hundred thousand have been taken from Maine fish for next year's stock. The commission has purchased a large number of trout eggs from private hatcheries, the plan being to plant a large number of fry in the brooks of the state next spring.

"If a general law can be passed," they say, "making a reasonable limit on the number of trout that can be legally taken from brooks we hope to see an appreciable improvement in our brook fishing, not only in the best fishing localities, but in places where the brooks have been well nigh depleted."

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TWO MEALS A DAY

London Doctor's Simple Recipe for Long Life and Good Health—Certain Conditions Necessary

London, Jan. 7.—Two meals a day and an occasional fast is the recipe for health and long life given by Dr. J. S. Hooker, in a lecture before the Psycho-Therapeutic society in Caxton hall.

"The two meals a day plan," he said, "is a great preventive of catarrh, influenza, and a host of other diseases under the form of dyspepsia, gout, and liver affection. The best time for these two meals will depend to some extent on circumstances, but I believe if it were possible for us to take our first meal eleven or twelve, and our second at six or seven in the evening, we should be all the better for it."

"I myself have not had a cold for years, and am actually feeling younger rather than older as the days go on."

"The fasting cure is essentially the cleansing process, and is especially good for such diseases as gout, rheumatism, dyspepsia, internal troubles and growths, diabetes, obesity, purpura, blood diseases of all kinds, and skin affections."

"But certain conditions are advised. These are rest of mind; no business; healthy surroundings in which plenty of fresh air can be obtained; correct breathing in the open air, and after the first week, at all events for most patients, a good deal of bodily rest. No long fast should be undertaken at all without medical inspection first, and medical watch-dog."
