HAYES AND RYAN ARE LIBERAL CANDIDATES

HON. DR. FOSTER DECLINES OFFER OF CONVENTION

Says He Is Too Busy With
Other Party Work at
Present

FOUR OTHER NAMES ALSO SUGGESTED

Candidates and Former Fed-
eral Minister Address Meet-
ing at "Beatty"

ROBERT T. HAYES, former mayor of the city of Saint John and M. L. A. in the late Veniot Government, and William M. Ryan, barrister and former crown prosecutor, were nominated to contest the constituency of Saint John-Albert in the Federal elections at a Liberal convention in the Admiral Beatty Hotel last evening.

The names of Hon. W. E. Foster, former secretary of state in the King Government, Dr. W. P. Broderick, Dr. A. F. Emery, E. J. Henneberry and Fred M. Thompson, of Albert, were placed before the delegates but all declined nomination.

Speeches were delivered by the two candidates and Dr. Foster, in the course of which Dr. Foster said that the main reason for refusing the nomination was that he was engaged at the present time in a work that would be probably far more to the benefit of the Liberal party in Saint John and the province than he could accomplish if chosen as a standard-bearer.

TWO RESOLUTIONS

Two resolutions were passed by the convention. One expressed confidence in the leadership of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and the other expressed regret at the death of Hon. George H. Boivin, former minister of customs at Ottawa.

The first resolution followed: "Resolved, that the Liberal Party of Saint John-Albert in convention assembled record their confidence in the leadership of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, and that they endorse the policies of the federal Liberal party and pledge their assistance to enable our leader and the candidates selected to support him, to bring about those reforms and changes in the fiscal policy as will enable Canada to enjoy greater prosperity and improvement in government."

The second resolution followed: "Resolved, that this convention place upon record its deep sense of loss in the death of the Hon. George Boivin, late minister of customs in the cabinet of the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King."

Dr. Curren speaks

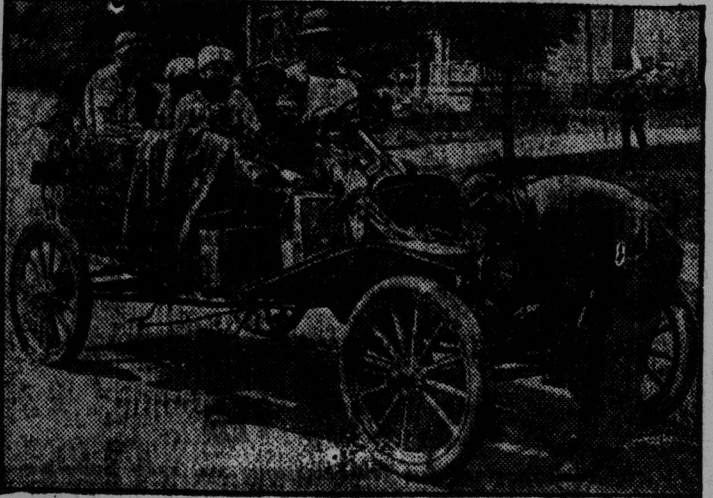
Dr. L. M. Curren, president of the central Liberal executive, was chairman and E. J. Henneberry was secretary. The chairman pointed to the budget of last year and said this was the main object of good Liberals and good citizens should look to as their motive for action in the coming campaign. This budget, he asserted, meant prosperity to the Maritimes.

The demand on the delegates was to return two good Liberals in this constituency, he said. He predicted the return to power of the Liberal party after Sept. 14. A return of a Liberal government, he said, would mean a good government and prosperity to Canada.

FOSTER MOVES RESOLUTION

Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster submitted the resolution of regret at the death of Hon. George H. Boivin, late minister of customs, given above. He paid a high tribute to Mr. Boivin. He said he was a man with a high sense of honor, with

PRaises BOVIN

Dr. William P. Broderick, in seconding the resolution, spoke eloquently of Mr. Boivin. He said he was a man of the highest integrity, one in whose hands a cause from any section of Canada could be placed and would receive full consideration.

Dr. Broderick said that Hon. Mr. Boivin was a politician of outstanding worth and merit and one who had been the centre of men of small politics. He said he was a man "in the summer of life whose talents were just budding forth to full fruition. It could be truly said of him, 'The paths of L. J. McDonald placed the name of George E. Ellis seconded the nomination.'"

Dr. Foster said he had given the matter very close consideration, but was forced to decline for reasons which, he said, he would give to the convention later.

Arthur Carter nominated Dr. A. F. Emery and John Whalen was the second.

E. J. Henneberry nominated R. T. Hayes and M. Ryan, of Albert county, was the seconder.

Wm. M. Ryan nominated Dr. Broderick, which was seconded by Jeremiah Donovan.

Dr. Broderick in declining nominated Mr. Ryan which was seconded by W. A. Lockhart.

A. C. Berrie nominated E. J. Henneberry.

F. M. Thompson, of Albert, was nominated by two delegates from that section.

Following the nominations Michael Kelley, of St. Martins briefly addressed the delegates.

HAYES IS SPEAKER

Mr. Hayes in accepting the nomination thanked the convention. He said that he was glad to be associated with a man like Mr. Ryan. Discussing briefly the issues of the present campaign he said that the Conservatives apparently were the only custodians of all that is good in the country. Referring to the customs probe, he said they seem to have forgotten the days gone by when their own party was very favorably considered by the intelligent people of Canada. Citizens generally, he said, were not getting excited over the walls of the Maritimes and what they were saying about the customs probe.

Referring to the accomplishments of the King government he mentioned the reduction in the tariff, in taxes and the features of legislation sponsored by the Liberal government. He claimed that the policy of the Liberal government was the only reasonable policy for the protection of industries throughout the Dominion.

RYAN SPEAKS

Mr. Ryan on rising to speak said that he was proud to be named a candidate in this constituency. He appreciated the honor, but added that he carried responsibilities of which he hoped he would prove worthy as time went on. He said that he had no personal ambitions but his only desire was to serve the city, the province and the Maritimes. He termed the present campaign a fight for Saint

CHOOSE DELEGATES

Central Baptists Select From
Representatives For Maritime
Convention at Woodstock

The following delegates to the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, to be held in Woodstock, from Aug. 28-29, were chosen by the congregation of the Central Baptist church at a meeting held last night after the weekly prayer meetings: Mrs. E. A. Wilson, W. W. Chase, H. Wank, the pastor, Rev. James Dunlop, and the pastor, Rev. James Dunlop. As the convention dates include the last Sunday in August Mr. Dunlop has arranged that Rev. Dr. Milne McCutcheon of the First Baptist church, Montreal, will occupy the pulpit of Central Baptist church on that day, which will also be the final Sunday of Mr. Dunlop's pastorate at Central Baptist church. Rev. Mr. Dunlop will enter on his duties as pastor of the Charlotte Street Baptist church in West Saint John on the second Sunday in September.

PRaises ROBB BUDGET.

The speaker said that both of the former representatives from Saint John-Albert had voted "yes" simply because it was legislation sponsored by a Liberal government. He styled Mr. Bell and Col. MacLaren as "high privates of the blocker brigade."

WHO CANDIDATES ARE

William M. Ryan is a native of this city, the son of Patrick Ryan, long a wholesale business man. Mr. Ryan was at one time a reporter on the Saint John Telegraph and sporting editor of other newspapers. He left the newspaper profession to study law and for about a dozen years has been well known as an attorney. Under the Liberal administration he was Crown prosecutor in this city. Mr. Ryan is a Roman Catholic and a member of the Knights of Columbus and other organizations. He has never been an elected political officer, but has been long active in campaigns.

Mr. Ryan is a brother-in-law of Mayor E. R. McDonald, of Shediac, also a well known attorney.

Robert Thomas Hayes, of Saint John, is president of J. M. Humphrey Co., Ltd., wholesale boots and shoes. He was alderman of Saint John from 1909 to 1912 and was mayor from 1916 to 1920. In 1920 he was elected to the provincial legislature. He was a candidate for the federal parliament last year with Hon. Dr. Foster, but was defeated.

Mr. Hayes was born on July 1, 1864, at Bedford, P.E.I., the son of William and Beulah Rebecca (Cris) Hayes. His wife was Miss Mary Irene Cris, daughter of William T. Cris, of Saint John. There are seven children. Mr. Hayes has long prominent in the affairs of the former Meliadist Church.

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SEES PEOPLE LED ASTRAY.

He claimed that when this was made known the delegates at the convention could readily see that it was the right course for him to pursue at the present time. He was not refusing the nomination because he had been defeated in the last election. He believed the people had been led astray by the cries of the Conservative party in the last election. This, he said, had been proven by the conduct of affairs in regard to the water powers of the province, in the matter of direct taxation and the tying of the hands of the various municipalities in the matter of their own financing.

DIRECT TAXATION ISSUE.

Dr. Foster declared that the matter of direct taxation was a real issue in the present campaign. If the people of this province, with a Conservative government at Fredericton, return a Conservative government on Sept. 14, the Conservatives, he claimed, would be imposed direct taxation. He said that he had no regrets over the loss of the mandate for the imposition of direct taxation. He declared that the question of Maritime rights had swept the people off their feet. Right matters and bring about changed conditions. He declared that state-ments made before the Royal Commission in Saint John bore out the principles and policies of the Liberal government.
