ceived at the agricultural department that a shipment of filled or imitation cheese from Chicago was forwarded to Liverpool via Montreal. The information in Liverpool indicated the shipment was made via Montreal to avoid the strict regulation of the United States regulating the manufacture and handling of filled cheese, in force 90 States imposes a tax of \$400 per factory per annum on manufacturers of filled heese and the penalty goes up to \$3,-000, and each cheese must be branded filled cheese and the same must be placed in packages. the post of British ambassador at Paris, was accorded a banquet at Belfast tonight, at which he made a speech. He declared that owing to his age and deaf ness he had definitely retired from official life. Although England was not loved, the Marquis continued, she had no dispute with any nation of Europe, except Turkey. The salvation of the Armenians, he asserted, cannot be found in any scheme applied to the Armenians alone, but in reforms giving protection to all Turkish subjects. The Marquis also expressed the hope that the United States and England would be the first to practically apply the principal of arbitration to the settlement of international disputes. Lord Dufferin said that every Englishman's soul would revolt in horror at the thought of any fratricidal collision with the United States which would only result in involving the United States and them in a common ruin.
