STATE OF TRADE.

STATE OF TRADE. (Montreal Trade Bulletin.) Several complaints have reached us this week of a quieter feeling in whole-sale circles, and a reduction in the volume of transactions. Remittances are also said to be slacker than usual at this season of the year. This, how-ever, is believed to be only temporary. A discouraging feature is the continued slackness of our export grain trade due mainly to the shortage in the corn crop of the United States and the diversion of a considerable portion of trade to other Atlantic ports, owing to the much lower ocean freights ruling there. Money is steady at 5 per cent. on call. although some daim they can get it at 41-2 per cent. Discounts on commer-cial paper are steady at 6 to 7 per cent., with a fair amount offering.

Every Russian is bound to serve a given number of years in the army, and when a con-script is shipped on any vessel the cap-ani is made responsible for the sail-or's retury to his native land. Failure to comply with this strict injunction is visited with serious penalties. The state, as it were, leases the services of its sailors on a fixed basis. When a saliof deserts his ship, therefore, the captain is bound to make every effort to locate the missing man. And so it is in this case. Captain Lénnox has not only employed Detective Power, but has signalied his willingness to pay all expenses connected with the man's apprehension."
