GENTENARY SUNDAY SCHOOL TO REOPEN TOMORROW

Building Has Been Entirely Renewed and is Now Finer Than Ever.

Fire in September last destroyed the portion of Centenary Church occupied by the Sunday school classes, and since then tinmiths, carpenters and painters have been engaged putting the building into shape, and tomorrow the scholars will assemble in their old quarters for the first time since the fire.

The main school room has been enlarged by the removal of a partition at the western end. The new space has been converted into two class rooms and a library. These are connected with the main room by folding doors with artistic glass panels. The new library room adjoins the class rooms.

The main hall is a very handsome one. It has been finished in natural stain. The windows are all new. They bear scriptural scrolls, and are very pretty. The roof of the building has been finished in natural woods, and the brackets are painted in brown and red. The platform has been enlarged and carpeted. Ten handsome clusters of electric lights are to be installed.

The primary department rooms have also been rebuilt in a most artistic manner. The windows in these rooms are all new and of amber color. The walls are painted in a heavy cream, and the brackets are painted in brown and red. The platform has been enlarged and carpeted. Ten handsome clusters of electric lights are to be installed.

THE INJUSTICE SHOWN BY THE M. P. A. A.

K. J. MacRae Thinks Suspension of Logan and Belyea is Entirely Uncalled For.

To the Star: All true lovers of sport hope that the M. P. A. A. will be able to re-instate Hilton Belyea and Fred Logan at once.

Being affiliated with the Canadian Amateur A. U. and working in conjunction with that body, it was necessary with that body, it was necessary to suspend these two boys. Having done so, I see no reason why they cannot re-instate them without any delay.

The M. P. A. A. is an organization formed for the purpose of keeping sport as purely amateur as possible, not to take sides in a case of friction between two associations, such as has occurred between the C. A. A. U. and the National Amateur Skating Association.

Here two amateurs leave St. John and go to Upper Canada to take part in an amateur meet,—there is no mention of any friction,—and they presume, as is the custom, and always has been the case heretofore, that these events would have been duly sanctioned.

But what occurs? Because the C. A. A. U. want to hold these events under their control, they refuse to grant sanctions to the N. A. S. A. to hold them, and notify the skaters, (who in the case of the St. John boys have come a long distance to compete, and have spent money and time on travelling and training expenses), the day before the races that there will be no sanctions granted, and if they compete, they will be suspended.

For what reason? Not because there is any doubt as to their amateur standing, but solely because they, the C. A. A. U., wanted to hold the races themselves and so would not grant a sanction to the N. A. S. A. to them.

Such action does not seem to accord with the encouragement of pure amateur sports.

It is to be hoped that the M. P. A. A. will be able to do as above suggested, and so help amateur standing in the province.

ST. JOHN PEOPLE HELP A SPRINGHILL CHURCH

Collections and promises for the day amount to \$150, which may be considered very good under existing circumstances in this town. The church was very fortunate in securing a splendid organ. It was the intention of the members to obtain the loan of one till circumstances would enable them to buy. The conditions were somewhat conveyed to Mr. Bullock, St. John, of Imperial Oil Company fame. This gentleman responded by at once purchasing a fine organ, and delivering it freight paid. Not only that, but Mr. and Mrs. Bullock and son are in town taking part in the opening services. Out of Sunday's offerings Mrs. Bullock alone is responsible for \$50, and the only condition laid down is that after these "friends indeed" have terminated their visit the church must find a player for its organ. John Bruce and friends all express their gratitude for this demonstration of love and good fellowship. The building of this church is the result of much patience, devotion to the cause and self-sacrifice on the part of Mr. Bruce, Sr., Duncan Bruce and their supporters in the work. Patrons and sympathizers have subscribed freely to the funds. There still remains some \$300 or \$700 to pay, which it is hoped will soon be paid off. Meetings continue all this week.
