MILLIONAIRE MORRISON MAKES MANY WEALTHY

British Recluse Divides an Estate Valued
at \$75,000,000—Government
Gets \$9,000,000.

LONDON, June 4.—With the exception of \$25,000 to be devoted to charities and his employees, the will of Chas. Morrison, the comparatively unknown millionaire, namely, a brother, a sister and two nephews, while two nieces get \$35,500 each and thirty-nine other relatives fortunes averaging \$50,000 each. The government will benefit in death and succession duties from the estate about \$9,000,000.

CAPE VERDE SAILORS

DRIFTED SIX DAYS

Whale Hunting in the Fog Proved Dangerous—Rescued by Sir. Admiral.

TENEBRIFER, Canary Islands, June 4.—The steamer Admiral today landed six members of the crew of the American whaling brig Sullivan, of New London, Conn. The men became separated from the whaler, while pursuing a whale in a thick fog and had drifted for six days. They were exhausted when picked up by the Admiral.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 5.—The boat's crew of six men which was landed by the steamer Admiral at Tenebrifer today, was lost from the whaling brig Sullivan, which fitted and sailed from this port on March 11, while seventy miles off Greatfish Bay on the West African coast. The crew was in charge of the third mate, Antonio Pama, and was known as the "third mate's crew." All were natives of the Cape Verde Islands.

SETTLEMENT REACHED IN THE BIG CAR STRIKE

Union and Company in Philadelphia Came to an Agreement Last Night.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 4.—The employees of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company late tonight voted to accept the proposition made by the traction officials. In the extreme northern and eastern sections of the city, the hot-beds of the rioting, the vote was almost unanimous against accepting the compromise, but as the horns in the less turbulent districts were heard from, the heavy anti-compromise vote was overcome and assurances were given that the cars would again be placed in operation tomorrow morning.

Fourteen hours voted to accept the terms offered by the company and four against, with one to be heard from. The total vote is 3,256 for to 619 against.

MET HORRIBLE DEATH SINKING IN QUAGMIRE

George McKay, of Brookfield, Mass., Missing—The Boy Is Being Searched.

BROOKFIELD, Mass., June 4.—The unusual and slow death caused by sinking into a quagmire is believed to be the fate of George McKay, of this town, for whom a party of men searched the borders of Cranberry Pond tonight without success. McKay and Leroy Eaton went fishing yesterday. Seeing a boat on the other side of the pond, McKay started after it, saying he would meet Eaton in the highway. The latter was delayed, and on arriving at the appointed place and not finding McKay, went to town, believing his companion had preceded him. It is supposed that he sank in the morasses which borders part of the pond and was suffocated. McKay was 36 years old and lived with his mother here. The town selectmen, at the solicitation of McKay's mother, will have official steps tomorrow toward searching for the body.

INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF SHIP OWNERS PLANNED

As Result of Frequent Strikes of Dock Laborers—Cossicans are Going Hungry.

BASTIA, Corsica, June 4.—The population of Corsica is in dire straits for the necessities of life by reason of the strike of the Marseilles sailors, which has been the means of cutting off their main source of obtaining supplies from the outside world. In addition the strike of the railroad men has continued for a month and many of the villages of the island are lacking in everything.

LONDON, June 4.—The Times says that in view of the frequent disputes with dock laborers in recent years, especially on the continent, another attempt is being made to form an international federation of ship owners. A

meeting was held in London a few days ago, which was attended by Scandinavian, Russian, German, French, Belgian and Dutch delegates and at it was discussed a draft of rules which will be submitted at another meeting. It is believed, the Times says, that by the end of the month an organization will be effected to deal with the international agreement that evidently exists among the seamen's and dockers' unions.

CHAUCHARD WILL HAVE HIS SWELL FUNERAL AT LAST

Paris Department Store Man Planned Ahead for a Glorious Send-off.

PARIS, June 5.—H. A. Chauchard, proprietor of the Magasin du Louvre, the big department store between the Palais Royal and the Louvre Palace, is dead. He had been ill for several months.

To Americans visiting Paris the big department store of M. Chauchard was one of the points of interest. M. Chauchard was a bachelor and in his declining years had been rather eccentric, his chief occupation being the arrangements of the details for his funeral. In the Pere-Lachaise Cemetery he built a sarcophagus costing \$16,000, purchased a casket for \$4,000 and set aside \$40,000 for his funeral. The funeral cortege will move to the cemetery through the boulevards, preceded by groves with lanterns, 300 messenger boys from the store, attired in livery, and the entire 4,000 employees of the concern. Following the hearse the friends of M. Chauchard will ride in old-fashioned state mourning carriages with coachmen in cocked hats and silver gloves.
